Will God Find You Faithful??

We are pleased to report that the response to this year's Stewardship Campaign has been quite good. As of November 16th, we are at 90% of our goal for the general fund and are only a few hundred dollars short of our goal for the mission fund. There are still a few folks who normally pledge that have yet to return their pledge cards. We hope that their response will help us meet or exceed our goals.

Of greater concern is the amount of pledged offerings we have received so far in 2014. In response to the 2013 stewardship campaign, \$130,893 was pledged toward the general fund and \$19,140 was pledged for missions. As of the end of October, we have received only \$94,554 for the general fund and \$11,378 for missions. These amounts represent 72% and 59% of the amounts pledged for the general and mission funds, respectively. If the offerings for November and December are similar to those for the first 10 months, we will fall well short of our expected pledge income for 2014.

Please review your giving for 2014. If you have fallen behind on your pledge, please do what you can to get caught up before the end of the year. If you have questions about your contributions so far this year, Bonnie Kettle can provide you a full report on your 2014 giving.

As a reminder, your pledge is your faith promise to contribute to the furthering of God's kingdom here on earth.

BOOK REVIEW

"I Am a Church Member"

I believe coincidences are sometimes more than that, and such was the case in picking up "I Am A Church Member: Discovering the Attitude That Makes a Difference," by Thom S. Rainer (B&H Publishing). I sensed it was more of a holy nudge since, not only am I seeking to become a member of FBC, our pastoral leadership has been talking a lot about such concepts as "Every member a minister," and how that equipping takes place, largely with changed attitudes.

Rainer points out how many of the nation's churches are "unhealthy," with more members

complaining and taking an entitlement attitude (what can the church do for me?) than becoming involved through active participation in the church, even offering community outreach with a servant attitude.

In brief chapters, the author lays out six actions that could transform the churches across the world and the individuals who attend them. Each ends with a pledge readers can commit to, as well as questions to consider for the journey.

The chapters encourage readers to be functioning church members; unifying church members; to not let their churches be about their own preferences and desires; to pray for church leaders; to lead their families to be healthy church members; and to treasure church membership as a gift.

Some of the principles Rainer lays out include the importance of all members being necessary parts of the whole Body of Christ and how God equips members to use their spiritual gifts and talents to minister to others.

Regarding unifying the church, the author quotes Jesus' words in John 13:35, "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." He warns against gossip and negative talk, which can become a hindrance at many churches, urging instead forgiveness and unity.

Rainer notes the word "servant" is used 57 times in the New Testament, often referring to roles expected of us as Christians. Too many people, the author says, leave churches because things aren't being done their way or are looking for the church (and pastors) to serve them rather than acknowledge a personal role that involves giving, not just financially, but as service to others.

An old adage, "The family that prays together, stays together," came to mind while reading Chapter 5 on approaching church life as a family — your own, the local church, and the larger Church body. The final chapter is a reminder of what a gift it is by grace — to receive salvation and be "placed by God" in a church (1 Cor. 12:27-28).

The 79 pages can be read in one sitting and would also make a good personal study to meditate on for a period. It received accolades from such notables as Rick Warren, who noted "this wonderful little book explains the power of belonging to a church family," and other well- known names who called it inspiring.

Several copies were available at McCarthy's Emporium in Olean, with the books also available online.

BEHAVE LIKE A CHRISTIAN 9 Let love be without

9 Let love be without hypocrisy. Abhor what is evil. Cling to what is

good. 10 *Be* kindly affectionate to one another with brotherly love, in honor giving preference to one another; 11 not lagging in diligence, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord; 12 rejoicing in hope, patient in tribulation, continuing steadfastly in prayer; 13 distributing to the needs of the saints, given to hospitality. (Romans 12:9-13)

Without a doubt there are many hurting peoplenot only in the world at large but also with the Christian community and even within our own congregation. People who are lonely, but unwilling to ever let others know how they feel: people who have had their feelings hurt by an untimely word, or some piece of gossip; people who have trusted someone to be there for them in time of need only to horribly let down;... The list could on, yet we know the pain is real and the scars can be very deep.

So what does Paul tell us to do that we may be a people that can lift and heal hurting people? First and foremost we must love others. That means putting their needs ahead of our own and this must be done in sincerity. Paul says "without hypocrisy" or rather not for show or to look good to others. The prophet Jeremiah spoke of this in Jer. 9:8 "friendly words for their neighbors come from their mouths. But their minds are things up ways to trap them." You may know what people want to hear, but it does not take long for them sense the real sincerity of your words. We prove the sincerity of our words by our actions. To show concern for someone who is in real pain while you talk with them and then walk away never to think of it or pray about it again (it's not my problem) is hypocrisy. We are called to bear one another's burdens. Let us do that with love, honesty, and joy.

Secondly, Paul says live a life that is different from the worldly standards. Your likes and dislikes should be different as a Christian. I believe the best way to find out what a Christian should look like is to ask an unbeliever what he thinks a Christian should look like. The world knows that we are not to look like and act like they do. We tell them that we have something better than this world can offer and our lives need show that what we say is true.

Though there is so much more in this short passage, let me conclude with verse 12. "As we look to the hope that we have in Christ the things of this world become far less important. Therefore, with our mind set upon the things above we can endure the tribulations that may befall us."

I remember my time in the Navy and when anyone was within 100 days of getting out he had a short timer's calendar counting down the days to being a civilian again. With that in view, the little trials became only an inconvenience because the end was in sight. And so as we see the home prepared for us with all of its glory it will put into perspective the short time we have here. Even with the battles we may be facing, they will become far less important for the end is in sight. Yet, what are we told to do, "be steadfast in prayer". Praying for deliverance, for protection, and for the proper perspective of whatever it is that we may be facing.

So with pressures of this Holiday season upon us let us love one another in sincerity. Let us cling to that which is good. And let us rejoice in hope. By this, may the hurting find comfort and a lost and dying world see the real reason for the season.

..... From the

Pastors Heart

"Advent": the dictionary tells me that advent is a noun and its definition is "the

arrival of a notable person, thing or event" such as "the advent of television in the 1950s".

Of course it also refers to the first season of the Christian church year, leading up to Christmas and including the four preceding Sundays. In addition, it refers to the coming (or second coming) of Christ.

Some people are fond of reminding Christians that Christmas has ties to pagan holidays such as Roman "Saturnalia" and German "Yuletide" and that December 25 is in all likelihood not the true day when Mary gave birth to Jesus.

My response to such reminders is to simply say, "Thank God." Our celebration of the birth of our Savior is not about making sure the date of that birth is commemorated, it is that Christ's arrival life among us is honored. Incorporating some of the traditions and practices of ancient celebrations and redefining them into a Christian context was a wise way to help people translate faith in Christ into their culture.

It's hard for us to imagine what it would be like to live in a culture where Christianity is not the prominent religion celebrated. We have seen a struggle in recent years as the diversity of our country has continued to grow and the influence of other religions has risen. Resentment over a specifically Christian holiday on the national calendar has caused merchants to downplay Christmas by using words like "Holidays" and "Seasons Greetings." And we are well aware of the controversies and lawsuits regarding nativity displays on public property.

Many Christians have responded in a backlash to this, calling this resentment "The War on Christmas" and organizing boycotts and filing lawsuits of their own. It does seem ironically contrary to a celebration of the coming of "The Prince of Peace".

If you study the history of how Christmas became a national holiday in the U.S. you will find considerable controversy. The Puritans considered many of the celebrations of Christmas to be decadent and even outlawed such celebration in the early years of colonial life. It wasn't until after the Civil War (during the presidency of Ulysses S. Grant) that congress passed a bill declaring December 25 (along with New Year's Day, the 4th of July and Thanksgiving) to be national holidays. It might interest you to know that Christmas was far more popular in the southern states than in the northern states at that time.

And even then many Christians feared that creating a federal holiday would lead to commercialization and corruption of something that was (and is) considered to be a holy commemoration. Those concerns were prophetic it seems.

But the truth is Christmas is what you make it. Even before my dad died when I was little my family didn't have much. I can't say that I didn't look forward to the gifts I would receive on Christmas (what kid wouldn't?) but it has always been more about family togetherness – and food – for me. Before he died, my dad was working 2 jobs so we didn't see that much of him. But he was home on Christmas. And usually we travelled to his parents' house and gathered there with his extended family for a few days. And boy did my grandmother put on a spread!

After he died, we went to live in a house right across the street from my paternal grandparents and that is when I started to connect the dots between Christmas and Jesus. I don't remember our small church ever having Christmas Eve or Christmas Day services but I vividly remember the pageants I participated in. They were always held on Sunday evenings and they involved costumes, lots of music and best of all – they made me feel like I was part of the Christmas story. That made the true meaning of Christmas real to me. And it sure didn't hurt that it made the people I loved most proud to see me (and my brothers and sisters) participate.

So, in a way I think we are still translating faith in Christ into our culture. It seems that from the get-go, the origins of Christmas leaned toward raucous partying, consumption of alcohol and overeating. Then we added snowmen and candy canes, Santa Clause and reindeer, not to mention Christmas trees and wreaths... and "Black Friday".

So join an Advent group, volunteer for our Vacation Bible Christmas outreach, help out with the pageant and make sure your kids and grandkids are here for the Birthday Party for Jesus! It is not the role of society to translate the true meaning of Christmas. It is up to you and me.

"In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." 1 Thessalonians 5:18

This culture of gratitude – where spiritual leaders give thanks for the church's fellowship and God's followers give thanks for ministers' and missionaries' spiritual guidance – is deeply ingrained in the Christian faith.

Since the mid-1930s, American Baptist congregations have received a Communion Fellowship Offering on the first Sunday of each month to support needy and elderly clergy within their churches. In 1948, churches began donating to the November Communion Fellowship Offering, providing financial assistance to the denominations' elderly ministers, missionaries and their widowed spouses. In 1977, American Baptist Churches USA officially launched the Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering (RMMO) to continue this tradition of thankfulness. Since 1980, MMBB has sent "Thank You" checks drawn directly from the MMBB endowment to eligible retired lay church employees.

The Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering commemorates the anonymous gift in 1981 of a Vietnamese refugee woman worshipping with the First Chinese Baptist Church of Fresno, California. Not knowing the full intent of the offering, but understanding the words "thank you" printed on the offering envelope, she slipped off her wristwatch, her only possession of value, and placed it in the envelope.

The Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering is a personal offering, one rooted in thanks for the countless ways ministers and missionaries guide each member of the church along their spiritual journey. It provides a tangible way for American Baptists congregations, to say "Thank you for …" the commitment, service and spiritual guidance of retired ministers, missionaries and their widowed spouses. The offering supports those who have devoted their lives to God's service by providing emergency assistance in their times of need and, for those eligible, a "Thank You" check at the end of each year. In 2013, RMMO provided \$1,141,295 in assistance and Thank You checks. For 2014, the national RMMO goal is \$1.2 million.

During the month of December our congregation will receive the Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering. Please help us remember the denomination's retired faithful servants with love and gratitude. Our goal is \$750.00, a chance to say...
