Romans 12: 1-2 "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

> After doctrine comes duty After revelation, responsibility After principle, practice The just shall LIVE.

My dictionary says consecration is the act, process, or ceremony of consecrating; the state of being consecrated. Consecrated is to be made holy; sacred or honored as holy; hallowed.

<u>Who can be consecrated ?</u> Only believers for he says "I beseech you...brethren" It is totally impossible to live a victorious, consecrated life for Christ without the presence and power of the Holy Spirit in that life. Therefore, the first step to a consecrated life it to know that I have Christ as my personal Savior and that His Spirit dwells with in me. Romans 8:9 "*But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you. Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his.*" So all who are His has the potential and the responsibility to be consecrated.

What does it mean to be consecrated? First the body, "present your bodies". This would encompass all the physical life.... all that we do with the body. I Cor. 6:19-20 "What? Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." Here we see the body as a temple, a sacred place where God dwells; therefore nothing should defile the temple.... rather it is to bring glory to God. However, it is not only the body here spoken of, but also the mind. "be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind." Paul tells us "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace." (Rom.8:6). So we must change or transform our minds from the way of this world to that of the world to come. "To set our affections on things above, not on things on the earth." (Col. 3:2)

How to become consecrated - We must yield. "Present" and yield have the same meaning here. Rom. 6:13 tells us not to yield to unrighteousness but to yield ourselves unto God. To yield is to voluntarily surrender to the leading of the Holy Spirit. Too often we know what the will of God is for our life and yet we find that we must be dragged kicking and screaming before God can get us where He desires us to be. Rather the consecrated life is one that immediately sets aside any personal plans or goals and seeks only the plans and goals of God for his life. With each step of willingly presenting ourselves we become a little more "transformed". The Holy Spirit changes our minds, attitudes and perspective of life. As Rom. 8:29 tell us "...to be conformed to the image of his son." That is to be our ultimate goal.

<u>Why we should be consecrated</u> – Because of "mercies of God." All that we have received in love, grace and forgiveness we are to respond in giving ourselves back to Him. There is nothing we can do to earn our salvation or God's favor. But because of His love we yield to Him. And we are told that this "is your reasonable service." Not something unusual or extraordinary but only that which is reasonable. It only makes sense that I will love and serve in return the one who loves me to such a degree.

So what area of your life do you need to yield to Christ today? Do it now that you may have peace and joy from the Lord.

FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART....

It is my understanding that the radio broadcast of our worship services began during World War II. Gas rationing was under way and

too many of our members were finding themselves unable to get to church. Dr. Shields Hardin was the Pastor and this was perceived at the time as a temporary solution to a temporary problem. God had other ideas!

For approximately 70 years this ministry has evolved. Can you imagine the difference between the sound system and control board of the 1940's and the one that's in our "Radio Room" today? At the time we began airing our services a weekly "Religion in the News" program during the week was also sponsored. At the time AM radio was just really hitting its stride.

Of course for most of the years these broadcasts were provided live (warts and all) as they went out over the airwaves. If the services ran over (and they usually did) we either imposed on the generosity of the station airing our service to cut into their regular programming – or they cut us off.

All that changed 8 years ago when we moved our worship time to 9:30 and began a tape-delayed format for broadcast. This was done mostly to accommodate the blending of our contemporary and traditional services but it allowed our technicians in the Radio Room to clean up the broadcast, eliminate the glitches and shorten it within the allotted hour of airtime. We often pushed them to the limit, giving them less than 15 minutes to get that done before we had to go on the air.

We don't thank Paul Geise, Dave Anderson, Darlene Selph, Chris Rosel and Micki Ellis often enough for their faithful service not only with the radio broadcast but in making our worship experience as visually and audibly efficient as it is.

FM radio grew in popularity in the 1960's with a more static free, cleaner sound. Given the excellence we are known for in our congregation's music ministry, FM broadcasting has always drawn our interest but whenever we explored the possibility of moving to that side of the radio dial we found it cost prohibitive. The bargain of maintaining an hour of airtime for just \$45 a week has been hard to pass up!

Not long ago someone in leadership here suggested that it might be a good idea for me to network more with business people in our community. Not long after that I saw an ad in the paper for a membership drive that Rotary Club was having. I decided to check it out. A few weeks later I found myself joining.

During the Christmas season the station manager for a group of FM stations known as "Colonial Radio" happened to sit next to me at a Rotary meeting. As we visited I mentioned that our services were broadcast on WOEN on Sunday mornings and that we had considered moving over to FM.

Colonial's stations include News Radio 96.7 WVTT (Voice of the Twin Tiers), BOB Hometown Country (93.9 and 103.9), Mountain 98.7 (which plays a little of everything) and EAGLE 99.1 – "America's Country". During our conversation she mentioned that she thought Colonial would be able to help us get an FM broadcast accomplished. I gave her my business card and asked her to call me after the holidays.

For the past several months we have been discussing the possibility offered to us by Colonial of moving our service over to EAGLE 99.1 FM. Paul Geise and Dave Anderson have been integral parts of those conversations with the Colonial management team. In addition we started tuning in during the week to both WOEN on the AM side and to EAGLE on the FM and comparing the quality of sound at various locations inside and outside of Olean.

Because of our long-standing (and fruitful) relationship with WOEN we also wanted to offer them the opportunity to match the offer that Colonial was providing us. Unbeknownst to us, we discovered that WOEN has a sister station in Salamanca and that they have been simulcasting our worship broadcast on that station since last December! The broadcast range of the Salamanca station is significantly larger than the Olean station, so apparently that broadcast has been covering the Bradford and Ellicottville areas for the past few months! We were impressed by that.

Unfortunately a move to WOEN's sister FM station (MIX 101.5) was not something they would consider so our choice is now clear. Either we stay with our present (though recently improved) AM broadcast or we move to a new station on the FM side. The big question is which station will serve our listeners best. I agree with those who are hesitant to sever a relationship that has served us well for 70 years but I believe this new opportunity is too good to pass up. It will increase the cost of the broadcast by \$10 per week but I think it is worth it. We will entertain further discussion on this at the congregational meeting on May 10. CLARKS FIND OFBC 'NURTURING'

When Yvonne Perry Clark moved

back to Olean from Louisville, Kentucky in 2000 to be closer to family, she knew she wanted to find a Bible-based church to meet her spiritual needs. "I had done some research and found the First Baptist Church online," Yvonne said. One of the first people she met was Carol Molyneaux. "She sat with me at church and just took me under her wing." Soon Yvonne was involved in the Seekers Sunday School class, serving on the Mission Board, and even joined a committee to help develop church growth.

At the same time, she was busy in her career as a counselor. One day she met James Clark over the telephone. He was a counselor for an arm of Yvonne's company based in Massachusetts, and they sometimes consulted. "We would talk, then one day we decided we would like to meet each other face-toface," Jim said. Jim has a human services background serving individuals and families who were in crisis mode and also providing emergency support for foster care parents. He said he has many years of experience helping people through various stresses. "We knew we were both unattached and we seemed to share interests in the same things," added Yvonne, who said they both found satisfaction in helping to empower people. "We also already had a connection through our conversations."

So the couple agreed to meet in Owego, New York, each driving part way, and soon each visited the other's community. "We knew we felt an emotional connection and a spiritual connection so we kept communicating and meeting with each other," Yvonne said. "And the rest is history," Jim added.

They were married in the Portville gazebo in 2009 before family, friends and church family members. Yvonne moved to Massachusetts and counseled there until August of last year. The couple then made a decision to relocate to Olean, partly due to Jim experiencing some health issues and Yvonne knowing they'd have a support network here. "This is a permanent move," Jim said. "We both love this church, this area, the people and the culture." Both feel right at home at First Baptist. "The church is down-to-earth and you get a one-on-one connection whether you're a stranger or brief acquaintance or have been here awhile," Jim says. "It seems you can trust people if you tell them something or if you need help, there's always someone there. That's important to us."


Yvonne says they've both been counselors for many years and realize the value of people helping people. Locally, she's also worked at the Rehab Center, the Day Treatment program, and in alcohol and drug education as well as her job at ESI-EAP, an employee assistance program based in Wellsville. She will soon go part-time, but that doesn't mean she won't be busy. She sings in the choir, among other activities, and likes to be involved. "I get nurtured by my friends here — socially and emotionally," she said. "This has been a wonderful connection for us." To that, Jim nods. "I agree," he said.

...COMING IN JUNE !!!.....

"The Harmony of the Gospels" New Sunday School Class w/ Mike Hooten Occasionally, skeptics have accused the gospels of contradicting one another. Sometimes one gospel gives an account which is totally omitted in another, or the order in which the events are recorded in Luke differs from the order in Mark. We are all familiar with Jesus' famous Sermon on the Mount; however, Luke records the Sermon on the Plain with nearly identical content. Did the famous sermon occur on the Mount or on the Plain or were there two? The last recorded words of Christ in Mathew and Mark are "My God, My God why hast thou forsaken me." The last words recorded in Luke are, "into thy hands I commit my spirit." In John, the last words recorded are, "It is finished." Are there truly discrepancies between the accounts?

In June I will have the privilege of leading a Bible Study during the Sunday School hour in which we will do a comparative study of the Gospels. Where do they parallel each other? Where do they seem to diverge? How can we learn from what at first glance may seem like discrepancies? I would like to invite you to join me as we explore and discover the beautiful harmony of the Gospels and deepen our understanding of Christ and His story as we delve into God's Word together.

Preacher/evangelist Joyce Meyer has sold a lot of books throughout her career, but her most popular bestseller is "Battlefield of the Mind: Winning the Battle of Your Mind," (Faith Words, 1995). When I recently faced a time of experiencing intrusive and unwanted thoughts, I remembered the book. After a move, however, I couldn't find my copy and figured I must have loaned it to someone in the past and forgot about it. I was pleased to find a copy in a local Christian bookstore, and more so that the book had been updated. It was just the review I needed as Meyer points out strategies God has laid out in the Bible to combat such affliction.

The introduction right away reminds readers, "As a man thinks in his heart, so does he become," (Proverbs 23:7), and that negative thinking can result in a negative life. One reason we must learn to direct thoughts in positive ways is that Satan is eager to offer wrong thinking, even to put the thoughts right there in our minds — but the good news is we don't have to accept those thoughts and can learn to counter them. As we learn to approach life "according to the Spirit," as it says in Romans 8:5, by setting our minds on and seeking those things that gratify the Holy Spirit, we develop tools to live a more satisfying life.

Meyer points out the first step is recognizing our minds are a battlefield and our thoughts do matter. Jesus called the devil "the father of lies and of all that is false" (John 8:44) and will largely bombard our minds with doubt, suspicions, fears and other negative influences. But we can learn to counter his tactics. One tactic is to keep a positive mindset (Chapter 5) and Meyer provides Scripture to help reinforce this. Prayer and supplication is another way, even to battle demons and what Meyer calls "mindbinding spirits."

Part II of the book addresses various "Conditions of the Mind," with encouragement to learn to become aware of what we're thinking. Meyer then provides real advice on how to counter wrong thoughts and to help us get back to a place where we realize we really do have the mind of Christ and should be thinking accordingly. I especially liked Chapter 12 regarding "An Anxious and Worried Mind," with its many verses that lead to victory and less distraction. There are reminders that God has always met the needs of His people — and meets our needs now. It encouraged me to be reminded we can learn to trust God and not be anxious even facing trials. "Being at peace, enjoying the rest of God in the midst of the storm gives much glory to the Lord because it proves that His ways work," Meyer writes. Chapter 14 warns against a passive mind, however, and points out we must remain "alert, cautious and active," and stay away from general apathy, lukewarmness, and laziness, largely so the devil doesn't get a toehold.

In Part III, Meyer uses the biblical experiences of the Israelites to address "Wilderness Mentalities" and how to keep from repeatedly going around the same mountain. Another passage that resonated for me was this: "If you know God has asked you to do something, don't back down just because it gets hard. When things get hard, spend more time with Him, lean more on Him and receive more grace from Him," (see Hebrews 4:16).

While I sought out the book for tips on a specific type of defeating thoughts, I was reminded of everyday tactics to keep fostering "a renewal of the mind" as God does a work in us. I'm keeping the new copy of the book within arm's reach.



TREASURES IN CLAY POTS

I visit in a different church nearly every weekend and often one or two more during the week. Some congregations are enjoying growth and expanding ministry; others are facing challenges and strategizing how to move forward; and some are simply trying to place the buckets to catch the leaks. When I think back over the churches I've visited. these differing circumstances are not what leave a lasting impression. I've seen so many buildings, honestly sometimes I lose track of which building belongs to which church. I usually remember: big or small, brick or stone or wood, and was it hot or cold that day. These are not the things that organize my memories.

Rather, I carry in my memory a sense of whether these folks enjoyed being with one another. Were they caring for and listening to each other? Did they laugh and smile? Were they comfortable in one another's presence? Did their conversations show evidence of trust? Did they look for the best in one another? In other words: were they having a good time as they gathered?

Paul writes about carrying the treasure of the Gospel in jars of clay (2 Cor. 4:7). I've always liked the picture he paints: something irreplaceable in a container that would lead us to believe otherwise. Who would guess that an invaluable treasure lies within a jar lying about the kitchen? It rings of that treasure buried in the field that one sells all that one has in order to buy that wonderful field (Matt. 13:44) Who could have guessed that the field held such a wonderful surprise?

Our churches are like that field or that jar of clay. Embedded within them is the treasure we have in one another. Our churches are not fundamentally buildings or a set of programs; rather they are fellowships, families, and communities. What takes place among the people within them is a good measure of the health of the congregation! And does that health spawn a shared passion to transform one another, their community, and their world in the name of Jesus Christ? This is a good barometer of their ministry.

When you arrive at church the next time, look for the treasures being carried in the clay vessels of those whom you meet in that place. You might find that you are having a better time and that you feel a renewed vigor for ministry.
