# FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART.....

I hope your summer has been enjoyable and meaningful and that you are as excited about what

autumn has to offer as I am!

Back in June when we put out our last newsletter I shared my sadness over the impending departure of 2 colleagues (Pastors Larry Poelma of First Baptist Church of Cuba and Brad Chesebro from Olean's Trinity United Methodist). Brad left in June to accept the call of a Methodist Church near Utica and Larry will be retiring at the end of September.

I can't tell you how helpful and important it is for pastors to gather regularly and support one another. There is much about ministry in the local church that most people don't get. Most of what we do is pretty private – things like counseling, sermon and lesson prep, visitation, correspondence and administration and meetings to plan future events. Other pastors know about this and we are often able to provide advice and resources to one another to make our ministries more effective and to help us find peace in the midst of what sometimes seems like endless busyness and chaos.

One opportunity for this kind of relief came at the end of June for me when I traveled to Kansas City to be part of our denomination's Biennial meetings. The American Baptist Churches, USA call representatives from all of our churches together every other year so that we can discuss what is happening amongst us, commission new missionaries and worship together. I have only gone to 4 or 5 of these gatherings in the course of my 30-plus years in the ministry but with changes happening so rapidly in our denomination (and across denominational lines in the church in general) I thought that it was important to go this year.

I was not disappointed. In addition to inspiring worship on several occasions every day, this gathering offered bible studies. (Do you know how often I get the opportunity to attend a bible study I am not leading? What a treat!) They also offered several guided discussion groups on the subject of leadership, on revitalizing aging churches and on what the future looks like for our denomination.

I opted for the discussions on revitalizing older churches. What I discovered is we are in pretty good shape compared to most – and that we seem to be following the path that other churches are following in a culture that is rapidly changing. I also heard in more

detail how mission support is changing and I met several missionaries who are in the process of getting commissioned for missionary service in places like Africa and Thailand. I was also able to reconnect with Dave Reed (who was here in March with his wife Joyce to share their ministry with us on a Sunday night). Dave and some pastors from Kansas joined me for lunch at a Kansas City barbecue restaurant for lunch on Saturday. If you haven't had KC barbecue you are really missing something!

Probably one of the things that stood out most about my experience at the Biennial was the profound implications of several major transitions in leadership in our denomination. Our General Secretary, Dr. Roy Medley and the Executive Director of our Home Mission Society, Aidsen Wright-Riggins are both retiring this year. Farewell celebrations were held for both of them during the weekend and presentations were made at worship together. These are men who have served our family of churches well during difficult times and they will be missed.

On my way home from the conference I had the privilege of visiting former Pastor Mac Shotwell and his daughter Paula after the death of Mac's wife and Paula's mother, LaVerne. We had a great time together sharing memories and catching up on people we mutually know and I had the honor of bringing LaVerne's remains back to Olean and Cuba to be buried. I also was given a DVD of LaVerne's memorial service in Illinois to share with anyone interested in viewing it.

I returned home just in time for the last day of Vacation Bible Camp, which was another great success with over 70 kids attending! And then that very weekend we hosted Gold City for their phenomenal concert here on July 5. Although the crowd was not as large as we anticipated the experience was so great that we are already in the process of negotiating to get Gold City back again next Independence Day weekend!

We also had another fine gospel group, The Jonathans, contact us about hosting them for a concert in September. The Diaconate met briefly after church in July and decided to sign on to host them on Sunday evening, September 13. Please mark this on your calendar! If this event ministry is going to flourish we will all need to be as supportive as possible.

Since then we have planned the stewardship campaign for the fall and started movement toward gathering our nominating committee. I took 10 days of vacation at the end of July and performed a couple of weddings: Don and Jodie Martin's son Don and Raquel Martin and Dave and Nancy Taylor's new son-in-law



Xavier writes "I was born with asthma and was in and out of the hospital, almost every month. There was much concern for me as I couldn't blow air out very well. When I was 5 years old, I wanted to blow the shofar like my grandfather. I heard its sound – like the voice of God. I saved my money and bought my shofar. The shofar takes a lot of breath to blow. I practiced and blew it. Ever since then, I have not had a problem with asthma."

# OUTLINE FOR BIBLE STUDY

Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that

needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth (II Tim 2:15)

I do not believe that there is anything more important to the successful Christian life than daily Bible study. Too many Christians never open their Bible having been convinced by the devil that they cannot understand it or they may feel that they just do not know how to do it. So I would like to give you a few simple pointers that hopefully will make your time in the Word much more meaningful.

**I. OBSERVATION:** First you must develop a full awareness of what is present in the Biblical text. Start with small bites. Take a paragraph and read it a couple of times. Awareness involves careful reading and recognition of important elements. Ask yourself such questions as: What is the principal subject of this chapter? Who is speaking? Who is he speaking to? What is being done? When is this taking place? Where are these things taking place? Taking the time to see the details is very rewarding. A passage you may have read many times can take on a whole new meaning to you as you notice that this was spoken late at night or to just one hurting person. In thirty-eight years of ministry I have read my Bible through numerous times. Still I am always amazed at the new things that jump out at me. I often wonder how I never saw that before. But it is the Holy Spirit that guides and teaches us what we need for that day. He knows the trial that you are facing at that very time and knows just what to give you so that you can be victorious.

**II. INTERPRETATION:** This concerns answering the central question: What does it mean? The process involves investigation for answers. Comparing scripture with scripture. This is where a reference Bible comes in handy. But no matter if you use a concordance, commentary or reference

Bible, it will take some work. However when you have labored over a passage and dug out a golden nugget that is something very special that belongs only to you. Two things that are of vital importance in interpretation are content and context. Whenever a verse is taken out of context you can totally destroy its meaning. There can be many applications to a passage but only one true interpretation.

III. APPLICATION: The final step focuses on how the truth works in your life. We do not study for study sake alone or to show off to others how much we know. We must choose to apply it to our own lives for this day. So as we examine the passage we are asking: Is there an example for me to follow? Is there an error for me to avoid? Is there a duty for me to perform? Is there a promise for me to claim? Is there a prayer for me to echo?

As I close let me say that all of your study should start with prayer. Ask God to open the passage to you and let Him know that you are willing to do whatever He reveals to you. Then keep a notebook of all the wonderful truths that God will give you from His Word. Start today and you will be amazed at what it will do for your walk with the Lord. You will soon find yourself falling in love with the Word of God in a way that you never thought possible.

# GOLD CITY 'WOWED' OLEAN AUDIENCE

The Olean First Baptist sanctuary was filled to the brim with praise and worship through music on Sunday, July 5 when Gold City came to town. The group consisted of Daniel Riley, Chip Pullen, Robert Fullerton, Bryan Elliott (on piano) and newest member Chris West, who sings with a rafter-rocking deep bass. Gold City's crystal clear voices rang out over the crowd on such well-known hymns as "Victory In Jesus," "Power in the Blood," "It's Still the Cross," with a good blend of fast-paced gospel that make you want to stand up and praise songs that find the audience reaching toward heaven.



Group member Daniel Riley witnessed about how his father, Tim Riley, a member for more than 50 years, had suffered a stroke but has been determined to beat its effects. One of the T-shirts for sale in the lobby, along with CDs, was a shirt Tim had designed that said, "Keep Calm and Pray On, God is in Control (Philippians 4:6).

During one portion of the program, Daniel also said, "If we didn't believe God could take a use an ordinary group of guys like us, we wouldn't be doing this," giving God the glory for their success as a top-tier group in the gospel industry. The concert also included a call for others. "More than anything, it's our prayer if you don't know Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior, before it's eternally too late, just ask Him to be Lord. If you don't have a relationship with Him, it's all in vain." He asked the question, "You may know Jesus, but does He know you? Some people make it so complicated, but the Bible is very clear: WHOSOEVER will call upon Him will be saved. It's how you can have joy in times of trouble." This invitation led into one of the group's signature songs, "Midnight Cry," which, indeed, did make some audience members tear up with its powerful message and the voices singing it.

the group as they were passing through Olean, and was covered with a love offering from attendees. Group members expressed an interest in possibly coming back next summer with more time to plan and advertise that event so seats could be filled up.

## INSPIRING 'LOVE LETTERS' FEATURES TENDERHEARTED CHARACTER

After a couple of beach reads this summer,

which I often find too graphic or full of offensive language, I returned to more trusted summer fiction, one being Beverly Lewis's "The Love Letters." The prolific queen of Amish tales once again delivers, offering up richly drawn characters in bucolic rural settings. In the author's note, Lewis says main character Marlena Wenger had been in her heart for a long time and was, "perhaps, one of the most tender-hearted protagonists I've written to date."

Marlena is staying with her newly widowed grandmother in Brownstown, Pennsylvania, in the late 1960s when they get word that Marlena's older sister, Luella, has been seriously injured in a car accident. Marlena still struggles with why her sister left the Old Order Amish community and married a soldier, who was then sent to Vietnam.

Soon, relatives bring Luella's baby, Angela Rose, to Brownstown, expecting Marlena to care for the little girl. Marlena hesitates but is willing—temporarily—to do it. She also thinks of her own plans back home being put on hold. She was soon to receive instruction to be baptized into the Old Order Amish church and then be able to marry her beau, Nat.

The plot thickens as Luella experiences complications and passes away. Further attempts are made to contact her husband in the military, all while Marlena begins to bond with their child. Marlena continues to write letters to Nat, who sends letters in return, but he is anything but patient with the fact she hasn't just turned the baby over to someone else and come home. Meanwhile Marlena becomes friends with Sarah Mast and her brother, Luke, who attend a New Order Amish church in Brownstown, and she is curious about its differences from her family's church.

In typical Lewis fashion, alternate story lines are weaved throughout the book, including an adventurous circumstance involving Marlena's younger brother, Small Jay. The lad is mentally challenged and often feels useless on the farm. He befriends a man he discovers sleeping at the old mill.

Trouble is, the man cannot remember much about his own life, only that he is called Boston because he once lived there. Family members believe Boston is just a figment of the boy's imagination until the story takes some turns.

With this title, Lewis continues to follow her interest in all things regarding Pennsylvania Dutch country where she was born, and in creatively pursuing her interest in her mother's Plain heritage through her storytelling.

On a personal note, I once had the privilege of meeting the author and got to watch as she graciously signed books for every fan that turned out for a book event in a Christian bookstore, and there were more than 200. Her inspiring stories of life and faith have endeared her to millions. Fans will also want to watch the shelves in September for a release of her latest, "The Photograph."

# **INSPIRATION** From *The Ultimate Priority* by John MacArthur, Jr.

Although it is intensely personal, there is nothing self-centered about genuine worship. If believers are to maintain a consistent life-style of continuous worship, they need the fellowship and encouragement of other believers as they assemble for group worship. Individual worship and corporate worship feed each other. So on the one hand, I need the fellowship of the saints. On the other hand, the community of saints needs me to live a consistent life of worship.

The source of most of the problems people have in their Christian lives relates to two things; either they are not worshiping six days a week with their life, or they are not worshiping one day a week with the assembly of the saints. We need both.

If you go to church only when it is convenient, you will never be victorious and productive as a Christian. You can't succeed on your own; you need to have the spiritual stimulation of fellow believers. We live in such an easy-come, easy-go, casual, flippant society that people don't make consistent, faithful commitments, and then they wonder why they fail. The answer is clear. Spiritual success requires commitment to others.....

A pastor went to see a man who didn't attend church very faithfully. The man was sitting before a fire, watching the warm glow of the coals. It was a cold winter day, but the coals were red hot, and the fire was warm. The pastor pleaded with the man to be more faithful in meeting with the people of God, but the man didn't seem to be getting the message.

So the pastor took the tongs beside the fireplace, pulled open the screen, and reached in and began to separate all the coals. When none of the coals were touching the others, he stood and watched in silence. In a matter of moments, they were all cold. "That's what's happening in your life," he told the man. "As soon as you isolate yourself from God's people, the fire goes out." The man got the message.

The church is not the brick-and-mortar building in which the assembly meets; it is God's people in whom He dwells. In the church—among God's people, the true worshipers—we must bring a worshiping heart to stimulate others while being stimulated to love and good works. As that stimulation affects our souls we do good and share. The cycle is complete when we live out the overflow of praise and a continual heart of thanksgiving. Then worship is a way of life. For that we were redeemed.

### CALLING SIN, SIN

A bomb exploded in our nation some years ago. In mid-America, of all places. The fuse was lit first in the mind of Karl Menninger, but its effect was not felt until his pen detonated the blasting cap. Suddenly—without prior warning—BOOM! His book *Whatever Became of Sin* stunned and shocked his colleagues.

Most of Menninger's peers had put that hated word to bed decades ago. But now, *the* Karl Menninger, M.D., the Freud of America, whose book *The Human Mind* had introduced psychiatry to the American public back in 1930, that respected, competent pioneer of the profession, actually had the gall to reintroduce SIN to the vocabulary!

All had been relatively quiet on the Western front. America was still licking its wounds from the riots, campus rebellions, and political assassinations of the sixties. We were biting the bullet of a prolonged war in Southeast Asia. We were hearing rumblings with strange names back then—ecological concerns, energy crises, and "do your own thing." Most of us sensed trouble was brewing...something was wrong. But none dared call it SIN.

Maybe our president would admit it. Lincoln did, way back in 1863. Eisenhower did, borrowing his words from Lincoln, when the Day of Prayer rolled around exactly ninety years later: "It is the duty of nations as well as of men to own their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon."

But Eisenhower's subsequent calls to prayer never mentioned that explosive term again. In fact, in 1972, Frederick Fox of Princeton University stated in a compelling article entitled "The National Day of Prayer": "Since 1953, no President has mentioned sin as a national failing. Neither Kennedy, Johnson, nor Nixon. To be sure, they have skirted the word....I cannot imagine a modern President beating his breast on behalf of the Nation and praying, 'God, be merciful to us sinners."" "As a nation," admitted one wag at the time, "we officially ceased 'sinning' some twenty years ago."

Then came Menninger, who was gutsy enough to declare the truth. Was what he said new? No, not new. It had been there all the time. It just needed to be declared. May we all have the courage to say that—to call sin, SIN. Some words need to be deleted from our vocabulary; others need to be reinstated.

Let's be gutsy enough to declare the truth and call sin, sin when we need to. —Chuck Swindoll


