"Come Rain or Come Shine" By Jan Karon

-- latest in quaint book series

It's been a few years since I first fell in love with a small town called Mitford, set in the mountains of North Carolina, a place rife with unique and interesting residents. Mitford isn't a real place; it's the figment of author Jan Karon's imagination. But the town and its colorful people could be real, as I have known individuals with some of their traits.

Karon once had a successful career in advertising, but at one point she tired of the big city and went home to the mountains, unsure of what she was going to do. She tells how one day she was looking out the window, and in her mind's eye, she could see a figure hunched over in the wind. That was when Karon conceived of Father Timothy Kavanagh, an aging Episcopal priest, and wondered what his life was like.

Beginning with "At Home in Mitford," Karon went on to pen 12 books in the series—plus a few offshoots—leading Father Timothy through a late in life marriage, the adoption of a son, and many adventures with his Mitford community members. The recently released "Come Rain or Come Shine" offers what long-time Mitford series fans have been waiting for: the wedding of Kavanagh's son, Dooley, to another "throwaway" child that friends adopted earlier in the series.

Dooley and Lace at first hated each other as youths, even they both hailed from troublesome backgrounds that might have found them sharing things in common. Over the years, however, they came to acknowledge their attraction. But the young couple practiced patience, with both in college and not wanting to disappoint their adoptive families. The wait was longer than most, because Dooley was studying to become a veterinarian.

In "Come Rain or Come Shine," Dooley is about to buy out a longtime mentor and friend and establish his own practice at Meadowgate Farm, a setting that has appeared in earlier books. The couple wants a simple wedding at the farm, but things get complicated as the anticipated date arrives.

Karon writes from several viewpoints, but primarily uses Lace, Dooley and Father Tim as they share thoughts and memories of their times together. Some of the former characters from Mitford appear briefly, such as Esther and her famed Orange Marmalade Cake. Dooley's fractured family members also gather for the event, and the reader can see healing, but distances yet to travel on their journeys from what happened in their lives. I don't know if this is Karon's final book in the Mitford series, but if it turned out to be I could be satisfied with such a bookend on a series I have come to enjoy and love. The author provides a satisfying ending—or new beginning—for the two children readers first met as rejected ragamuffins. She offers a contentedness to Father Timothy's life after his many adventures as rector of not only Mitford's church, but others he'd pastored, and a just right feeling about his retirement.

If you are searching for a good read for the coming winter months, I suggest you get a list of the Mitford books (online or in the cover of a recent one) and snuggle into the recliner for a satisfying escape with some colorful characters facing mysteries, challenges and rural mountain life.

THINGS THAT THE LORD LOVES

"These six things doth the LORD hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto

him: A proud look, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief, A false witness that speaketh lies, and he that soweth discord among brethren". (Prov. 6:16-19)

From the text I have chosen it would be easy to take the negative side of our actions. Those are spell out very clearly and they should not be overlooked or in any way dismissed as unimportant. However, I would like to take a few moments to look at the other side of these character traits and actions.

- 1. **A Humble Spirit** Prov. 16:19 "Better it is to be of a humble spirit with the lowly, than to divide the spoil with the proud." One of the fruits of the Spirit in Gal. 5 is meekness. Meekness results from the realization that all we have and that we are is of God and not of ourselves. The meek are the true servants, for meekness is abounding strength held in restraint, and expressed in service. They are the wealthy men, for in such submissive service is the secret of possessing all things. Thereby, they are giving all of the glory to God and not trying to take it unto themselves.
- 2. **Speaking the truth** Eph.4:15 tells us to speak the truth in love. Isn't a shame that in today's culture we must be continually reminder to tell the truth. There was a day a man's word was his bond and could be trusted. Especially as Christians we need to be people of our word. As hard as it may seem at times remember God loves us to speak the truth,
- 3. **Hands that heal the guilty** Mat. 5:44 "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you;" It might be easy to say that I have not killed anyone who did not deserve it. But have you helped, healed, encourage and prayed for those who (in our minds) do not deserve it. This is the thing that God loves. For when we see all men created in the image of God and in need of a restored relationship with Him then we are looking at man as Christ looks at man.
- 4. **Thoughts that are true and Godly** Phil. 4:8 tells us to think on things that are true, honest, just, pure, lovely, that have a good report, and that have praise to them. Our thought life can easily make us or break us. If you desire to be doing that which God

loves then keep you mind on truth and things which honour Him. "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 2:5).

- 5. **Feet swift to follow the Lord** Many are like Peter who followed the Lord a far off (Mark 14:54). But that which the Lord loves are those who run to follow Him. Let us each morning seek and devour the Word of God that it may be the "lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path" (Psm. 119:105). Then we will be able to run and not be weary, walk and not faint but rather mount up with wings as eagles. (Isa. 40:31)
- 6. **A friend that speaks the truth** We are to stand by our friends and brothers in Christ as they are being falsely accused. "A Friend loveth at all times" (Prov. 17:17). And we know that there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother. (Prov. 18:24) So if we are conformed to the image of Christ we too will sticking close to comfort and strengthen our brothers.
- 7. They that build unity among the brethren The sowing of discord is the selfish act of I want my way. Whereas the building of unity says I want God glorified first and foremost in the body. Each person in the body has their own personality, goals, desires and agenda. When we are able to set those aside and seek the peace and over all prosperity of the body that is what the Lord loves. So let us seek to live a life that the Lord can look upon with joy and love.

From the Pastor's Heart...

Just as we did in 1014, we spent a lot of time in August, September and October of this year talking about the church we

want to be. During worship in August our Board of Missions told you a little about the ministries that we support and why we support them. Cari Matejka shared her experiences in Africa and her passion for continuing the work there and I announced that I am feeling led to go to Africa with Cari next year to gain personal perspective on what God may be leading our congregation to do there.

In September we introduced the stewardship theme "Thrive". The chorus of that popular Christian song proclaims: "Just to know You and to make You known; We lift Your name on high. Shine like the sun, make darkness run and hide. We know we were made for so much more than ordinary lives. Its time for us to more than just survive. We were made to thrive"

Those words describe what we are aiming at in 2016. In September we heard from Chris Rosel as the Chairwoman of the Board of Christian Education about the ministry of discipleship we are trying to offer here.

We also heard a passionate plea from Casey DeGroff about the need in our church for dedicated leadership on the Diaconate Board. Casey asked us to picture in our minds someone we would consider to be our "consummate deacon"... Who would you choose to be *your* Deacon? And then she challenged us to ask that person to serve in that capacity in 2016! The vision of the Diaconate Board for 2016 is to put our best and brightest in the position of serving there as spiritual leaders.

The last week of September we heard from Dave Torrey and the Board of Trustees about the work of that board and the issues that they are beginning to contemplate in regard to our building and finances in the years ahead.

In October our Fellowship, Music and Communication Committees were represented by Nancy Taylor, Bev Firth and Dave Anderson, sharing their perspectives on that those committees hope to accomplish next year with your support.

Meanwhile in September I shared 3 messages emphasizing the importance of every member of our congregation striving for greater spiritual maturity and unity. And in October I spoke to you from the heart about the ABC's of stewardship (Attitude, Belief, Consecration and Desire). The focus was Malachi 3:10: "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the LORD of hosts; see if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing."

I offered a money-back guarantee along with the challenge to take up God's challenge to put Him to the test at least for one week (on October 25). As I write this, that date still lies before us and I am praying that you are prayerfully considering taking up that challenge.

Last year I told you that "in order for the world around us to believe in the vision we espouse, we must demonstrate its effectiveness in our attitudes, our compassion, our faithful confidence as we share the faith, hope and redeeming love of Jesus Christ with all people by striving to be the church of Jesus Christ where every member is a minister.

To do that more effectively in 2015 I proposed:

- **A.** Our highest callings are to be **beacons of truth and life.**
- B. There is no substitute for private devotions.
 Sunday School, group Bible studies, radio and
 TV teaching, etc. are important but God speaks
 to our hearts best when we are alone with Him.
- C. **Introduction to the Old Testament**: To prepare you for those devotions we will offer an introduction to the books of the Old Testament (as we did for the New Testament in 2013).
- **D.** We will focus more attention on **leadership development** next year by offering opportunities to learn and grow in leadership skills.
- E. Last but not least, we need to **improve our outreach** by looking for opportunities to meet unchurched people and bring them into fellowship with us.

We didn't accomplish the Intro to the Old Testament last year so I am planning to do so in 2016. The only thing I would add to those goals is that our most effective efforts in leadership development will not come through seminars and classes. We need to develop leaders by mentoring those who are being called into leadership in our congregation.

There are obvious biblical models for this. Jesus mentored His disciples and Paul mentored people like Timothy and John Mark in the New Testament. The Old Testament is filled with examples like Moses and Joshua, Eli and Samuel and Elijah and Elisha.

It would be wonderful if the Lord were to add more new people with leadership skills to our fellowship (like He has recently with the Crowleys, Deb Wuetrich and Mike and Corinne Hooten). But ultimately our mission is to nurture and disciple people over the long haul so those who grow up here are equipped to serve and become the pillars this church has always had. People who God used to make this church what it has been in this community for 185 years!


