STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN 2021: AN AUTHENTIC LIFE

On October 17th, 24th and 31st, we will be presenting our Stewardship Campaign, "An Authentic Life". It is a look at the story of Joseph from the Book of Genesis and how he lived an honorable life regardless of his circumstances. As we prepare for this series we will be asking people to talk with Pastor Jason about times when being faithful led to a blessing from God. He wants to use these stories in his sermons or if you feel led, we can give you a couple minutes on a Sunday to share your story with the congregation. We pray God will bless this time as we consider how God is calling us to live "An Authentic Life".

VBS IS SEEING THROUGH CHILDLIKE EYES

Pastor Jason led a successful Vacation Bible School July 18-21, taking children from the church and a few friends through the Creation story. Approximately 20 young people, including teen helpers, participated while members of the Christian Board of Education oversaw various activities.

Each session began with interactive lessons, which included demonstrations about the earth, air and other wonders as gifts from God. Children attempted to balance a ping-pong ball on top of a straw using their breath for control and tried out paper airplanes they had constructed. Most were amazed by the reaction of volcanoes they made from baking soda, food coloring and vinegar, however one girl said, “Ew, we have to eat this?” while a boy said, “This feels weird” while shaping the baking soda like a sand castle. During a lesson on how God spins the earth and keeps things in motion while providing gravity so we don’t float away, a child could be heard stating, “But I don’t feel like we’re moving.” Asked for a list of favorite things that fly, “Unicorns” made the list, as did eagles and dragonflies.

“God saw everything that He made and it was very good,” said Pastor Jason, “But that was just the beginning of the story. On the last evening with families as guests prior to a picnic, our pastor demonstrated how sin separates us from God, using a jar of liquid substances with a red strip in the middle. “People do selfish things and hurt one another,” he shared, to which one child piped up with, “We really messed up!” But God has a plan, Pastor said, pointing out how we can see the story in the Bible. “God sent his Son, Jesus, into the world to do something to make it better.” He then added liquid to the jar which cleared up the red strip of separation, first turning pink and finally clear again.

“Because of Jesus, that separation between us and God is going away,” he said. “That’s how God is fixing creation. He sent Jesus into the world to take sin upon Himself, then Jesus went back to God and God got rid of our sin.” He asked if the world was perfect now to an outcry of “Noooo,” then added, “Each of us can go back to being close to God the way He created us to be. But He’s not done with the world yet. He’s doing that bit by bit. But we don’t have to be stuck separated from God ever again and that’s why the story of creation is important. It reminds us everything was good and the Bible tells us it can be again, but we have to have faith.”

To close out the VBS, the children sang a creation song, along with “The B-I-B-L-E” while they

enthusiastically danced. The Board of Christian Education thanks Pastor Jason and everyone who made donations, including time, toward this year’s VBS.

THE PASTOR'S PAGE

I remember the devotion of your youth, how as a bride you loved me and followed me through the wilderness, through a land not sown. - Jeremiah 2:2

When I was going through the toughest years of childhood, my mother took my sister, my brothers and me to our church's Family Camp. It was a beautifully secluded stretch of beach on

the sand dunes of Lake Michigan. It was here that I discovered my love for walks alone with God in the woods and here that I first heard God's calling on my life.

The Presbytery of Chicago, who owned the camp, had to sell the property when I was a young adult to cover their growing financial debts. The paths I walked are gone, the cabins I stayed in have been plowed over to build mini-mansions and the stretch of beach where I prayed to God under the unpolluted night sky is now private property. I cannot go to this land without trespassing.

This is one of the reasons I am such a proponent for camping ministries. It was at camp that my broken spirit was mended, where I came to know who I was as a man of God and later, working for the camp in college, where I realized I was no longer a child and had to put some of my childish ways behind me.

Last week I took four of our Youth Group to Pathfinder Lodge near Cooperstown. Due to maintenance issues, our beloved Camp Vick is closed for the year as repairs are made, and so we prepared to go their sister camp, which is a four-hour drive away. Then late Wednesday night, before we were set to leave, the parents received word that camp at Pathfinder Lodge had to be canceled due to staffing issues. Our youth had already missed out on one year of camp due to COVID in 2020, and now they were going to miss out on a second year.

As parents and as church leaders, we only have so much time to work with our children and youth. Opportunities, like camp, give space for them to step away from the distractions of our culture, gain new experiences and broaden their understanding of the world. We teach and pray during these times that they would deepen their

relationship with God and come to understand Him and themselves better.

Tiffany and I made the decision, with the help of the parents, youth and the directors at camp to hold our own smaller camp, with just our four teens. While it was not the same experience they would have had, meeting teens from across the state, we pray it was a time that will help them as they face the year ahead. It was a great deal more work for my wife and I than if the camp had run as scheduled, but the youth of our church and their families are worth it.

Please pray for Camp Vick and Pathfinder Lodge, for their staff and volunteers. It is easy to point fingers and say these cancelations are their fault, but they are facing challenges that they had never faced before and are working hard to salvage what remains of the camping season. Pray for the children and youth who have experienced God in a new way. Pray for the future of camping ministry in our state. Such ministries are not guaranteed and rely on volunteers, donations and church support in order to survive in an environment of ever changing rules and regulations. In days like these, we need ministries like these more than ever.

THE MODERATOR'S MUSINGS

So much has happened over the last few weeks and we are facing quite a few challenges in the coming days, weeks, and months. For those who aren't aware, Paul Geise was recently diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and is facing a *long* series of chemo treatments and other medical procedures. While taking the treatments, Paul will be quarantined at his home. Many of you know that Paul plays a critical role in both the radio room and in the maintenance of our computer and WiFi networks at the church. While our utmost concern is for Paul's health and his recovery, we also must recognize that his absence will create issues that we must address. Now, Dave Anderson and Darlene Selph are certainly capable of handling the sound board in the radio room for the Sunday worship service, but they are going to need help or support with other activities in the radio room. Also, neither can address the computer or network issues that might arise. We will need others to address those concerns.

In sports, there is a saying that is appropriate for this situation. When a star or key player gets injured, the team must still continue to play the game. The coach will often shout, "Next man up!" Since this doesn't pass muster in our current politically correct or "woke" society, the coach might instead yell, "Next up!" That is a call for the next player at that position or the next available player to take the place of his or her injured teammate. So... imagine the chaos if no one responded... or if there was no one *to* respond. What chance does the team have to win playing short-handed? Or imagine that you are running a relay race. You finish your leg of the race, are physically spent and more than ready to hand the baton to the next runner... but there's no one there to take it! I imagine that Peter, Paul, John or any of the other early Church leaders must have been very concerned about who was going to carry the torch... who was going to continue to spread the Word... when their time on Earth came to an end. Would there even be a Christian Church had it not been for those who stepped up to continue the work? Thankfully, God inspired Timothy, Barnabas, Clement, Titus and many others to fill the void. Returning to our situation, many of us are beginning to wonder who will continue to "carry the torch" for the ministries of Olean First Baptist Church? Who will help fill the void created by Paul Geise's absence? Or in the bigger picture, who is going to take the place of the "pillars" we have lost in recent years... like Jim Kirkpatrick, Francis Sprague, Jim Chisholm, and so many others who were the spiritual or organizational leaders in our church? Who will carry the legacy of

Olean First Baptist Church into the future? And who will step up and volunteer to fill one of the many leadership positions that will open up on our Boards and Committees? These are all questions that cause some of us to lose sleep at night. And yes, I certainly realize that God has this. He knows the answer to all of these questions, and I trust that He has a plan and will execute His plan. But I also believe that each of us must be listening for or otherwise sensing God's call for "Next up!" Will you answer that call??

Changing trains of thought, I was working in my vegetable garden after returning home from nearly two weeks away and like many gardeners, I couldn't help thinking about the many varieties of weeds that were taking over. Most are easily recognizable but occasionally, something begins growing and you aren't sure whether it is a weed or a "volunteer" vegetable plant or flower that came up from dormant seeds for previous years. You decide to let it grow for a while to see what it becomes. Sometimes quite beautiful flowers or blossoms develop, but you still aren't 100% certain if it is something of value or an invasive weed. You struggle with the decision... do I let it continue growing or do I pull it out. You know that this plant is taking nutrients and moisture from the soil that are vital to the other food-producing plants in your garden. You wonder whether its flowers will continue to provide enjoyment or if it will begin to yield some type of produce? Or will it overwhelm or choke out the plants you are counting on to provide food for your table? You face a very difficult choice. Let it grow for a while longer and you risk that it could spread and destroy the rest of your garden. Pull it out and you might miss out on a special, unexpected gift. So... do you pull it or let it grow?

Before closing, I feel compelled to return to Paul Geise's situation. Many are likely asking what Paul did to deserve this challenge in his life... or maybe more to the point, why did God allow this to happen to Paul. While I absolutely don't know God's thinking in that regard, I do believe that God allows these trials in peoples' lives as a call to action for those of us who can help Paul during his difficulties... for those who can help fill the void during his absence... and to ALL who can pray for God's strength, healing powers and peace for Paul and for wisdom and discernment for the doctors who will be providing Paul's treatment. We must rest assured that God has a purpose for everything He allows to happen in our lives and in the lives of others. If we do not believe that, then we do not believe in an omnipotent, omniscient, omnipresent, and loving God. We must trust in God's will and His desire to do what is best for His people. GOD IS GOOD!! He has this!

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD GEARING UP



Planners at Olean First Baptist were thinking Christmas in July this year as they began getting things ready for

November. Our church is a regional Central Collection Site for Operation Christmas Child, a Samaritan's Purse ministry. Collections week runs Nov. 15-22.

Since 1993, Operation Christmas Child has collected and delivered more than 188 million gift-filled shoeboxes to children in more than 170 countries and territories. Samaritan's Purse President Franklin Graham said, "These gifts open the door for us to share God's love and the eternal hope of the Gospel with children and their families who are living in desperation and fear."

This is a project whole families may participate in. There is still time to shop and fill shoeboxes with toys, school supplies and hygiene items for children. Mission Board Chair Sharon Anthony is serving (with Pastor Jason) as lead coordinator for the project.

"One of the things I love about this is we can show children in a tangible way they are loved," Sharon said. "Not everyone has an opportunity to be a missionary and travel to faraway places but in a sense, anyone can go to the mission field by giving one of these shoeboxes."

Last year was the first that First Baptist operated as a collection site for Cattaraugus and Allegany counties and even took deliveries from the Jamestown area. Organizers look forward to doing it again, especially post-COVID, as they invite area families and our church family to not only pack boxes but to volunteer during collection week, just before Thanksgiving. Pastor Jason said several families came last year to help count boxes and load them on trucks and trailers. "We had a good time, from the smallest carrying one shoebox to those who could lift heavy boxes onto trucks." He adds such times also provide

teaching opportunities about generosity with children.

Interfaith Caregivers continues to serve community Interfaith Caregivers, Inc. recently held its annual Adopt-A-Ride fundraiser and continues to encourage support through tax deductible donations. The group hopes to maintain services to frail elderly and health impaired for FREE transportation to medical appointments and general errands. Interfaith Caregivers serves the Allegany, Hinsdale, Olean, Portville, Salamanca and Bradford areas, providing 50-65 round-trip transports a month on average. Interfaith Caregivers offers the following reasons to support Adopt-A-Ride:

- Free service means people don't have to put transportation costs before medical needs
- Family caregivers can count on their services to ease transportation responsibilities for their loved one
- Services help people to remain independent
- Interfaith Caregivers, Inc. represents the Olean Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired and provides funding for eye exams, glasses and vision tools, free of charge, as well as a monthly vision loss support group
- The agency organized the Gift Tree Program to help area needy families and served 102 families of various sizes in 2020
- Interfaith Caregivers, Inc. is in the process of bringing the Olean Medical Loan Closet into their agency as a community service
