Literacy of Love Update

I am thrilled to be traveling to Uganda for Christmas, not only to spend time with my Family of the Heart, but also because we have a monumental event taking place! We were blessed with giving and finalized the payment to our NEW PERMANENT HOME! We currently have 45 sponsored children, and the influx in our children caused us to buy some new decker beds, sheets, and blankets. The Lord blessed us more than we could have imagined in our new property. There is a small house for girls and a small house for the boys. We never expected to have a finished property complete with fence, gate, and living quarters, so this is beyond our dreams, and we are so thankful. To top it off, by the generosity of His faithful servants, we had a donation to buy 1 acre of farmland and fenced it. WOW! Those are pretty awesome blessings.

At the end of November, we sent emergency food money for many of the families we've helped support through the crisis of lockdown. Now, villages are experiencing drought, so food will be more scarce and prices will rise. During the holidays, prices increase, too, so we made sure to send them assistance in time!

Upcoming, we have three big projects we are focusing on. One, we put a down payment on shops in the village on the main street. It is walking distance from our new home, and we already started one graduate as our first business owner. These shops are a huge part of our long-term goals and will be a huge asset to the sustainability of LoL and for employing our own graduates by creating jobs. To finish this project, we are raising 45k to pay off those buildings. Second, we are developing our farmland with pigpens, a garden and a small room for the caretaker. To finish our land, we will need 8k. Lastly, we want to build a common room between the boys' and girls' dwellings We will have meetings, a common place for entertainment, and room for gatherings. We can accomplish this with 5k.

We are thrilled with the blessings God has bestowed on Literacy of Love, and we are so very thankful for all of our supporters and advocates! We know that each blessing is a responsibility that we are bestowed, and we take that role seriously! Together, we are changing lives and the cycle of poverty. These aren't just earthly children—they are souls the Lord has entrusted to our care and help. We ask for your continued prayer support, and we want you to know that every action—big or small—makes a ripple that extends and grows more than we know.

RETIRED MINISTERS AND MISSIONARIES OFFERING


"In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." 1 Thessalonians 5:18

THE PASTOR'S PAGE

When I was in Seminary, the most challenging class I had to take was CPE, Clinical Pastoral Education. Each Master of Divinity student was required to take at least one semester of CPE. This class was broken into three requirements. First each student had a twelve hour shift as a chaplain in the

hospital. Second we would meet as a class and discuss what we had experienced. And finally, we would have a one hour counseling session each week with the Chaplaincy Director who led the class.

One of my classmates joked that there was always one CPE student a semester who was cursed with death. We laughed and I wondered if it would be me. Now I don't believe in curses, but within the first few weeks I had dealt with more death than anyone else in the class. Most of the students talked with patients, held their hands as they were going through illness or injury. I held the hands of people who had just lost their loved ones. I was the only one in my class who had to walk family members to the morgue and I had to do it twice. I was the only one who had to hold a stillborn baby and pray with the grieving parents and I had to do it three times. I heard the terrible sound of people wailing over the death of their father, husband and friend who was supposed to have to have gone home from routine surgery that day, but didn't make it.

I was in my mid thirties at the time and I had been blessed with a family with good health. I had been to funerals before, but not of someone close to me. I had never dealt with death. The truth is, I did not look forward to my twelve hour shifts, but I dreaded going to our three hour classes even more because I would have to process what I had experienced that week. I didn't want to go to the counseling sessions because our Chaplaincy Director, in a Godly and loving way, cut to the depth of issues I had never dealt with before.

Then one afternoon I was called to a room with a pair of sisters, one in a bed, agitated but not

conscious and the other holding her hand in tears. The two sisters had chosen to live with each other as adults. They had no living spouses and no children between them. I was told the situation, the sick sister was declining and the doctors expected her to pass within a day or two.

As I listened, I felt defeated. What could I do? I couldn't restore her sister's health. I didn't have words that could make everything okay; that could prevent the grieving sister from having to face life alone.

So I did the only thing I could, I prayed for the sick woman. She had been tossing, moaning, unconscious, but struggling to hold on to life. She was in pain and great discomfort. As I prayed, her heart rate calmed and her moaning stopped. I prayed for God to comfort her, to support her sister as she showed her love and to bring His peace to both of them.

I walked in the room feeling I had the curse of death upon me, feeling hopeless and powerless. I walked out of the room with one of the greatest lessons for ministry. I am not the one with the power of life and death. I am a servant of God, and I will pray, no matter how I am feeling at the time. I will pray because it is effective and brings peace in situations where there is no hope. An unconscious woman felt the calming presence of God's Spirit upon her, and her sister felt a moment of peace. She was not alone.

The truth is, we are all cursed with death, and we can choose to live in despair, but I will always choose to pray, even when I am the one in grief or on death's bed. God has given these precious moments to hold each other's hands and support one another in prayer. He is the one working through us and teaching us along the way.

THE MODERATOR'S MUSINGS

I am writing these musings only a short time after learning

of the latest mask mandate issued by the governor's office. Those of you who know me well can imagine the thoughts and emotions I am having. I could spend this entire article expressing those... but I won't!! We are deep into the Christmas season, and I have far, far more important topics to address!!

Those who have been attending worship services know that we have been doing a special Advent Sunday School study based on Andy Stanley's "Who Needs Christmas." One of the questions Andy raised during the opening session was if we had any trouble believing the Christmas story... that God became man... that He was born of a virgin... that He was born in Bethlehem... that angels first appeared to shepherds... that magi from the east visited the Christ child, etc. It was interesting to pose those questions to the group of Christians that were in the sanctuary that day. Surprisingly, none of the folks in the room had any issues with any aspects of the story... but I wonder how I would make out if I asked the average person on the street. I'm confident I would get some very different answers from non-believers. Should that be surprising? No! Those who do not believe in God, or any supreme being would scoff at the idea of a virgin birth... or a Christmas star... or angels... and they would be especially skeptical of God becoming man. But we know better!! We who have faith know that a God who can create an entire Universe... create EVERYTHING from NOTHING... has no problem causing a virgin birth... creating angels... putting a brilliant star in the sky to announce the birth of His Son!! And given the cultural and societal issues of Jesus' time and the corruption that was prevalent in the religious hierarchy, it is not surprising that God would first announce the arrival of His Son to common shepherds. He knew they were longing for the arrival of the Messiah. He knew that they believed! He knew they would rejoice at the news!

So... how do we respond to this time of year? Is it a happy time? Is it a sad time? Do we take time to focus on the reason for the season? Or do we, like our secular friends, get caught up in Black Friday sales, trying to buy the perfect gift, stressing over mailing Christmas cards, attending office parties, and dealing with other distractions that divert our attention from why Christmas exists? In the "hustle and bustle of the holidays", it is very easy to overlook the incredible event that happened some 2000 years ago. How many times has God become man? How many times has the Savior of the world been born of a virgin? How many times has a plan been launched that would lead to the forgiveness of our sins... for eternity? Shouldn't we stand in awe of Christmas?? There was never anything like it before and there will never be anything like it again... except when our Savior returns to take His own home! My prayer for all of you is that you will take some time this season to really, *really* think about what happened that oh-so-holy night in Bethlehem. Emmanuel... God *with* us!!

Changing subjects, I thank all of those who stepped up to fill spots on our Boards, Committees, and to serve as church officers. By the time we closed the congregational/corporate meeting in December, we had filled all but three of the Board openings and all committee openings. We still have one opening each on the Board of Christian Education, the Diaconate, and the Board of Trustees. If anyone is interested in filling those openings, please contact any member of the Nominating Committee (Eli Rust, Cheri O'Dell, Matt Sage, Sharon Anthony, and Dave Torrey) or the Moderator (Jim Sorokes). If qualified candidates are identified, they can be voted onto the Boards at the January Corporate meeting. Note: In the case of any Trustee candidate, the vote will have to be conducted via secret ballot. We will also be ratifying the final 2022 church budget at that meeting as well as dedicating memorial gifts, remembering those who have gone on to their heavenly reward, and considering annual reports from our Boards, Committees, and staff.

Finally, as we embark on yet another new year, it's an appropriate time to take stock of where we've been in our individual spiritual walks and in our journey as a congregation. However, it is very important that we not dwell so much on the past that we don't think about where we are going in the future! Bluntly, there is not much we can do about the past because, well, it is the past, but we can absolutely have a profound impact on our future. Of course, it would help if we knew where we are going! Be watching and listening for more information in that regard in the coming weeks!! After all, how will we know that we've arrived if we don't know our destination?
