LITERACY OF LOVE UPDATE

We concluded the year 2021 with thankfulness as we reflect our challenges and appreciate our blessings. We have a renewed vision of our hopes and dreams as we begin to see some of the fruits of our labor. We have walked through the desert, and God has led us to a river. Our eyes are on the horizon as our minds are ever grateful for the lessons and challenges we've overcome! Experience is the best teacher, so when we combine that with God's grace, our entire perspective has shifted to see clearer than ever!

Our mission is to create a ripple of change one child at a time. When we change the life of one child, we change a family's history, and we build a new generation. I spent six weeks in Uganda during July and August, and I returned for Christmas and New Year.

During the summer, due to continued school closures and travel restrictions, we decided to make home visits to the guardians of all our children. We traveled deep into villages and to remote areas including Tanzania. It transpired into a transformational experience for our families and for me. Our children come from a variety of backgrounds. Some from mud houses and no electricity, others from huge families led by a single parent. No matter the situation, the same picture was clear: Poverty. Over the last (nearly) two years, we've helped support families with food due to the dire situation caused by shutdowns. We made personal connections and developed relationships with all families, and it was powerful for our children. This had never been done before. Some kids hadn't returned home in years.

Our visit provided us an opportunity to develop a new perspective. Our children, no matter how young, are the hope their family has. Despite having nothing, the child represents a way out. It was once explained to me, "An African child's life is not his own." It's 100% correct. They grow knowing the weight of responsibility of their family. Elder siblings become caretakers and providers for younger ones. Then, they find ways to care for their parents and grandparents, too. Our children start out with nothing, and as they grow, the little they have is used to help others. It creates a nearly impossible scenario to improve. But, with your help, our Family of the Heart members have a chance to be the change and break the cycle! Your investment in a child's future changes lives – changes society – changes history – changes the future. May God bless the work we've joined hands to do. Your prayers, financial, and social support are essential to our future. We acknowledge the

challenges and burdens, but we also share the joy of knowing that what we do truly does make a difference.

THE PASTOR'S PAGE

Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; ²⁰ you were bought

at a price. Therefore honor God with your bodies. (1 Corinthians 6:19-20)

Last month, I had a health scare. The symptoms were serious enough that my doctor told me to go to the emergency room. The worst-case scenarios were ruled out and I was diagnosed with Bell's Palsy, a harmless condition, which should resolve itself on its own and the symptoms have become less pronounced as the days pass by. The uncertainty of the condition was enough to get my attention and get me thinking about my health and what I need to be doing for the sake of my family and my ministry.

I have always been a bit lax about exercise and diet. I say to myself it is because I am always focused on the needs of others above myself, but in all honesty, that is a convenient excuse not to exercise. I need to reexamine how I view this kind of self-care. In 1 Corinthians 6:19-20, Paul reminds us that our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit and that we are to honor God with our bodies. The Lord purchased me, body, mind and soul through the blood of Jesus Christ.

That does not mean our bodies, our temples of the Lord will ever be perfect. I can exercise and watch my diet flawlessly, but I will still face decline as I grow older. We all will face illness and one day the death of our earthly bodies, if the Lord doesn't return in our lifetime. Imperfect as our bodies are, we are called to use it, to minister with it to the glory of God above.

One person who shows this well is the artist and writer, Joni Eareckson Tada. When she was 17, she was paralyzed from the neck down due to a diving

accident. She struggled with how, with a damaged body, she would ever live a meaningful life. But the gospel transformed Joni's life and she has spent the next 55 years choosing to serve God with her body, mind and soul. As she ministered to others, she found her body's disability was not a hinderance that God had to work around, but the very tool he chose to use to reach others in a meaningful way. She could have given in to despair, but instead she used her imperfect temple to bring others hope in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

God will use us, as we are, but as we give our hearts to the Lord, we also need to honor him with our bodies. We, as I have had to these last few weeks, need to look at how are we honoring Him in the way we are respecting our bodies, our minds our souls. My body is a tool which God is using to care for others. I need to be sure I take the best care of it I can.

THE MODERATOR'S MUSINGS!

With so many topics to address, this edition of the Musings is broken up into four segments.

Topic 1 – For those who attended our first attempt at a Congregational / Corporate meeting on January 16th, I apologize for letting my frustrations and emotions get the best of me that day. I said things that would have been better left unsaid. I am sure some took offense to my comments. Let me be clear, I do appreciate those who made the effort to attend, and I do believe there are more positives than negatives at our church. Are we perfect? Far from it, but that does not give me the right to go on a rant as I did that day... especially in my position as Moderator. I am called to “foster understanding and harmony in the church.” I failed! Maybe it’s good that I am a “Lame Duck” Moderator and must step down at the end of this year.

Topic 2 – To the retired men out there and/or those not working during the day, if you have not started taking advantage of the Thursday Men’s Lunch at Perkin’s, you should. It is a wonderful opportunity to meet with other men from our church for food and fellowship. Pastor Millard, though retired, continues to lead that group, reading inspiring devotionals, raising prayer concerns, and offering a thoughtful prayer before the meal. The conversations before and after the meals are always entertaining, covering a wide range of topics such as sports, plumbing, gardening and other outdoor activities, woodworking, home improvements, reminiscing about people, places, and things, and, yes, even politics now and then. Give it a try! I think you will enjoy it. We begin gathering at 11:45AM Thursday and usually go our separate ways by 1:30PM.

Topic 3 – Significant progress has been made on transferring ownership of the old carriage house to the Olean Historical Society. An agreement has been reached between the church, the owners of the other half of the carriage house and the Historical Society. The paperwork has been signed by all parties and Tyler Threehouse, the attorney who is representing the church, will be filing the petition to the New York State Attorney General’s office. Once the Attorney General’s office approves, the transfer will be complete. This is expected to take 4 – 6 weeks. For those unaware, the Olean Historical Society plans to convert the carriage house into an Olean History Museum. Our church will keep

accessto a small part of the building for storage. Special thanks to Matt Sage for leading the negotiations with the Historical Society.

Topic 4 – Returning to the Moderator’s role in fostering understanding and harmony, I must address issues that I believe are doing just the opposite. Recently, there has been unrest within our congregation related to COVID-19 policies, politics, and disagreements about how various things should be done at our church. These issues have led to confrontations between people, hostile exchanges on social media and the like. The passions associated with and wide-ranging perspectives on these topics are understandable, but, as believers in Christ, we should not react and/or respond in the same manner as non-Christians! We are not to conform to the ways of this world. We are to love our enemies. We are to turn the other cheek. We are to be peacemakers!! They will know we are Christians by our love, not by our sarcastic postings or angry outburst! We are to follow the guidance offered in Matthew 18: 15 – 18: “If a fellow believer hurts you, go and tell him—work it out between the two of you. If he listens, you’ve made a friend. If he won’t listen, take one or two others along so that the presence of witnesses will keep things honest, and try again. If he still won’t listen, tell the church. If he won’t listen to the church, you’ll have to start over from scratch, confront him with the need for repentance, and offer again God’s forgiving love.” (From *The Message*) I pray that we can work to mend relationships rather than tearing them down... find common ground rather than reasons to fight... unite rather than divide! “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.”

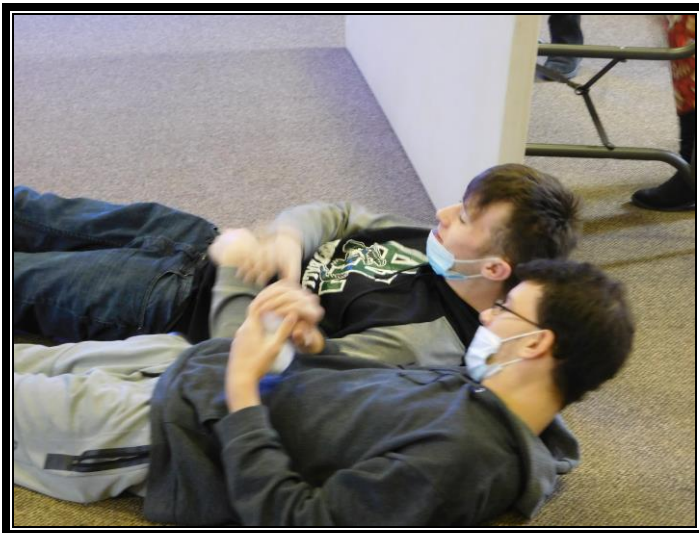
THANK YOU FOR YOUR PATIENCE ...AND GENEROSITY!

ST. PATRICK'S DAY FACTS

- **Why do we celebrate St. Patrick's Day on March 17?** This date marks the day of St. Patrick's death in 461. St. Patrick established his first church in a simple barn.
- **What is the real meaning of St. Patrick's Day?** Those who celebrate its intended meaning would adhere to it being a traditional day for spiritual renewal.
- **When was the first St. Patrick's Day Parade?** The first was actually not in Ireland but in Boston in 1737. An "official" parade was held in New York in 1766. Ireland had its own parade in 1903.
- **Who "invented" St. Patrick's Day?** Luke Wadding, an Irish Franciscan friar was persistent in efforts to turn March 17 into a Feast Day.
- **Was St. Patrick really Irish?** He was not born in Ireland, but thought to have been born in Wales or Scotland. He is said to have been abducted at 16 and brought to Northern Ireland. When he escaped from slavery, he had a vision and from that day on began spreading the word of Christ.

Be Sure You're Ready for the Help You Ask For

(The following was in my files from my time in a Michigan newsroom.. The message is just as relevant today, especially since I've been asking God for help shedding holiday pounds I've put on!)

“Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart.” --Psalm 37:4

I was reading a book that encourages the conquering of food cravings by turning to God instead. In “Made to Crave” (now updated to a new title) author Lysa Terkeurst shows how to turn focus from food to God.

I was taking the book to heart, praying for the strength to resist temptation and one afternoon, I'd finished my lunch of half a tuna sandwich, cutting back from old habits of having a full sandwich, chips, a cookie and whatever other snacks I might have around to munch on through the day. While feeling pretty smug at my day's effort, a mid-afternoon craving hit. It had been a busy couple hours and I really wanted something to eat or drink. I saw a co-worker's take-out coffee cup, but thankfully, was able to talk myself out of a cappuccino.

A bit later, though, I marched to a nearby coffee shop anyway, telling myself I'd just buy a small bottle of orange juice. That's when I noticed the sole muffin in the case. Surely one small muffin wouldn't hurt my new plan.

Back at the office, I sat down and started to take the paper off the muffin. At that moment, I noticed the song playing on the CD player in my head, a song we'd sung at church with the praise band. “Be my everything,” the chorus goes. I tore another bit of paper. “Be my everything.” Almost off now. “Jesus, everything.”

It wasn't lightning from the sky, but I knew it was God's way of speaking to me. He'd done it before through music. It wasn't “I'll strike you down if you take a bite of that!” In fact, as the message hit home, I was smiling, because I could almost feel HIM smiling along with a reminder of my requests for healthier habits.

In my experience, it only takes a verse, or a phrase, a song lyric, or a word or two to leave a whole impression on my heart when I feel God is speaking

to me. (The words almost always reflect wisdom from the Bible.) In this case, I felt like He was telling me, “If you want me to be your ‘everything’ and if you want to break your addiction to food, eating muffins in the afternoon is not the way to do it.”

I'd like to say I didn't eat the muffin, but I did. And as I ate, I contemplated the gentle teacher who used that moment of weakness to make me see what I was doing. It was like in Lysa's book, “Everything is permissible, but not everything is beneficial” (1 Cor. 6:12). We get to make choices. Jesus wasn't yelling at me, saying, “Don't do it!” But He planted the idea that if I was serious about overcoming poor habits and depending on Him to help me, I needed to make better choices.

People often view being in relationship with God as being ever-ready to face punishment of some kind, having to watch every step. But I've found being in relationship with the living God is joyful. He can be a delight, even as He teaches about serious issues.

Psalm 37:4 says, “Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart.”

Being in relationship with Christ IS a delight, and as we grow closer together, there is room for enjoyment and humor in the exchange—even when He provides a refrain from a song to remind me of what I said I wanted.
