
LIGHTING THE LONGEST NIGHT FOR GENESIS HOUSE

And like this close friend or family member, the Heavenly Father accepts us, warts and all.

This reality of intimacy with God in prayer struck me as I was working on a project on a maturity class for a discipleship series. I was reading about how prayer is like a close expression of friendship. Only prayer is with this incredible Being who is Wholly Other from me and you, yet wholly present for us in prayer.

Think about these words in terms of your prayer time with the Father:

Oh, that comfort—the inexpressible comfort of feeling safe with a person, having neither to weigh thoughts, nor measure words—but pouring them all right out—just as they are—chaff and grain together—certain that a faithful hand will take and sift them—keep what is worth keeping—and with the breath of kindness blow the rest away!

I like that description of our approach to an intimate encounter with the Father in prayer. It reminds me that prayer is a 'come-as-you-are affair'. You don't have to clean up or put on a false front. Just come as you are right now to the Father. You will find God welcoming you into his heart and presence. He has already declared that because you are in Christ you are his beloved child and, incredibly, he wants to be close to you. So let him! Just come as you are! There are high waves, rip currents, and flood warnings... not exactly what you would want while on a vacation at the beach. And vesterday was pretty much the same! Now, I could get frustrated or be upset by this weather pattern. I could ask God why he allowed this lousy weather to spoil our vacation. I could sit around pouting... oh, woe is me!! Or I could remember those incredible words from Paul... "I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do all this through him who gives me strength." (Philippians 4:11-13 NIV) And also from Matthew 5:45: "He causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous."

I have written and spoken many times about how time is our most precious commodity. And much as you can tell where a person's heart is by how they spend their money, it is more telling to look at how they spend their time... or maybe more to the point in this article, how they spend their time when circumstances are not to their liking! Yes, it is a miserable day outside, but does that mean I can't make meaningful use of my time? No, it does not. Oh, I could wallow in my personal pity party OR I could do something more fulfilling, like practicing on my guitar, reading a good book, reading the GOOD book, or... well, writing the Moderator's Musings for the next newsletter. As I have grown in my Christian walk, I have tried (sometimes successfully) to "be content in any and every situation." And as I look back over my life, I have become increasingly aware of how God changed or supported the direction of my life. In my younger, more self-centered years, I thought of these events as coincidences, but I no longer see them that way. It is

very clear to me that these were all part of God's plan for my life. When I responded positively, life was good. When I fought his plan, well, sometimes he hit me with that proverbial "two by four" to get my attention! He really can be quite persistent in guiding my way, so I've learned to be more open to his guidance.

Another way I've grown is to recognize and be more thankful for the gifts God has given me. Many know that our family was quite poor in my younger years. I often had to wear hand-me-down clothes from my Mom's brothers. This made me the brunt of jokes at school. However, I had parents and grandparents who made sure there was always food on the table and a roof over our heads. We took family vacations, stayed in cheap motels or cabins, ate at cheap diners... sometimes sharing our dinners with our parents. I still have vivid and happy memories of these trips. It's funny. I really didn't know we were poor until other kids told me we were. But I saw how hard my Dad worked to provide for his family... often working overtime until late in the evening. And Mom worked hard to keep our home in order and to keep us kids under control... not an easy task! And Mom and Dad both instilled in me a faith in God and a strong work ethic. I learned I needed to work for what I wanted!

So... as I sit in a beach-front house that we have rented on the Outer Banks, thinking about from whence I came, I thank God for my parents, my grandparents, my aunts, and uncles who were so influential in my early life. I thank Him for giving me the gift of writing and my love of science. I thank him for Sister Phyllis, my college English professor who saw my gift for writing that I hadn't recognized myself. I thank Him for convincing Yaz Sharif, my first boss who fought with the Human Resources Department to give a local kid a chance at Dresser-Clark. I thank Him for Charlie Green, my mentor, who put up with an inexperienced physics major and turned him into an aerodynamic engineer. I thank God for keeping me in Olean so that I would meet Penny Olson... marry her... and raise three wonderful kids (Megan, Dan & Kelli). I absolutely thank God for Penny's constant love and support. I thank God for all the saints at Olean First Baptist Church (you know who you are), who accepted me for whom I am and helped me grow in a faith that has become so, so important to me. Obviously, I can thank Him for so many more blessings He gave me, but I'm sure that you are sick of reading about them, so, suffice it to say, I know the source of my blessings. God is good!!

In closing, as we prepare to celebrate Thanksgiving Day, we should all take time to consider the many blessings that God has bestowed on us throughout our lives. It can be a very enlightening experience. Now, I realize that this might be difficult for some... especially those going through challenging times, trials, and tribulations... but it is vitally important to turn to God regardless of your circumstances... because (paraphrasing) "We can do all this through him who gives us strength."

A Tribute of love for Gaylord

When I was a kid, "DottieandSatch" was one word. If they were coming over to our house on Happy Hollow, we kids were told, "Go Play! The adults are going to talk." And talk they would, for hours over coffee at our kitchen table. Dad and Satch both served in the army and shared

military stories. Dottie was my

cousin, but

they were

more like



sisters. Dot was the first child down that family tree, born to mom's eldest sister, my Aunt Virginia and Uncle Joe. Our family stories included tales of how she was the first girl, then came a string of Lemmer and Gray boys. Everyone wondered when another girl would break the male streak. That chain-breaker was me, then real close, our cousin Becky and my sister Cheri. Soon came another string of boys before some younger girl cousins.

I spent a good share of my early childhood in the Fountain Street house under Aunt Virginia's care, surrounded by "big brothers" - and Dottie, who was more like my aunt. I was 10 or so when she married Gaylord Sage and they forever became DottieandSatch.

As a newly driving teen. I transported my voungest brother, Dale, to the Fountain Street house, by then inhabited by DottieandSatch and their two young sons, Mark and Matt. Dale ran in and he and Mark unzipped the bag to dump out plastic army guys and Gumby and Pokey figures while toddler Matt looked on. Dot had a nice little day-care going there back when youngsters typically didn't go to school until kindergarten.

When I married and moved to Michigan, I didn't see the Sages, or a lot of my family, for several years except during a few holiday visits. When I did, I always enjoyed seeing how the cousins had grown, first and second, once and twice removed and all that.

After my husband passed away in 2010, God took this internal longing for family reconnection and led me back home. I wanted to know my siblings better and expand the circle to their kids and grandkids and others in the family line. I was delighted when I found cousins I'd only known as little ones and some I was meeting for the first time. The interactions did something good to my heart. I think my time away intensified my need for family connection.

Satch played a special role in that. With a choice to "try out" First Baptist, remembering an early childhood here with my late father and Grandma Brown. I also remembered DottieandSatch were faithful attenders. Although Dot had passed, it felt good to know I'd still find family here.

Satch claimed me right away. Even though it was by marriage to Dot, we always related as cousins. In the parking lot or at events, he'd call someone over and ask, "Did you know we were cousins?" Soon, I did the same. He greeted me with a "Hi, Cuz," or more often, "Hi, Kid!" each time we met.

Our cousin, Becky, shared a similar experience. When she worked at Walmart, Satch came in and would tell anyone within earshot, "We're cousins, you know." She said Satch and his twinkling eyes made him her first crush.

I came to cherish FBC fellowship time, finding him in his spot behind the food table or near the coat racks. He'd greet me with the "Hi, Kid" and I'd walk in for my hug. I surely miss that! We always talked about family members, many long gone, how Olean used to be, and country music. My mom was a regionally known country singer and in my early childhood, every family gathering brought out the guitars, including Satch's. Such fond memories.

Some Sundays, I'd share old photos and we'd both get nostalgic. He was one of the few who knew and remembered my birth father. I was one of the recipients of the e-mail song posts Casey mentioned at his funeral. Sometimes I'd post back, telling him I liked one, too. I wish I'd done it more...

God blessed us with one last trip down memory lane together at OGH just before he re-entered the Pines. He was sharp and we reminisced and laughed. I told him I wasn't allowed to hug him because he was too fragile, so blew him kisses and he lifted his face to catch them, those eves that entranced my cousin twinkling for a moment. A final sweet memory.

I never knew him as Gaylord, only Satch, and then DottieandSatch. He told me how friends gave him the nickname during the popularity of singer/trumpeter Louis Armstrong, who was called, "Satchmo." Armstrong said folks in England dubbed him that while on tour. Coincidentally, another of Armstrong's nicknames, "Pops," is the one by which most of his growing family knew him.

At the service, I sat in back with my Uncle John, whispering now he's the sole keeper of the memories from that generation. As we sat there, we realized how those who are blessed with a long life get to play special roles to lots of people through the years.

During my years away, Satch was surrounded by his boys and now a big family that expands outward, like a ripple in a pond with new circles. Some of these, I am only beginning to know; with others, I just want to remain connected. Each Sunday, Matt opens his arms to me like his Dad, and I love that. I can also watch Ashley, Paige and Huntson, see family resemblances, and be in awe at how God uses DNA to connect us through several generations. I can also embrace extended family in another way-through their love of someone I love and passing it on. Satch loved my cousin Dot, joined our family and is now living eternal life with her again. (This "Kid" misses you!)
