As he pondered the issue, his thoughts drifted back to his sailor days in Liverpool, England. He remembered how at Stage Landing, where the boats came in, there was a large, iron kettle called "Simpson's Pot" into which passers-by tossed a coin or two to help the poor. The next day Captain McFee placed a similar pot at the Oakland Ferry Landing at the foot of Market Street. Beside the pot, he placed a sign that read, "Keep the Pot Boiling." He soon had the money to see that the needy people were properly fed at Christmas.

First Baptist Church volunteers are scheduled to help with the "Red Kettle" campaign this season at Olean Food Barn's main entrance. Shifts are from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., 1-3 and from 3-5 p.m. on **Tuesday, December 3**, Sign up in the lobby if you are interested in assisting.

GETTING HONEST ABOUT CHRISTMAS

When you read this newsletter, we will be in the Advent Season leading

up to Christmas. The church will be decorated to remind us of the splendor of this season, and we will be lighting Advent Candles each week leading up to the great white Christ Candle. We will ooh and ahh as children share in our church's services and our superb Senior Choir leads us in music of the season culminating in the Cantata on the Sunday before Christmas. Christmas gifts are being purchased and family gatherings are being planned with all the trimmings of the season. I look forward to our family traditions at this time of year. We will gather on Christmas Eve following the Christmas Eve service and have hors d'oeuvres consisting of all kinds of cheese, crackers and, because Beverly is of Swedish descent, the unique Swedish sausage called korv. Our tree will be decorated standing by the dining room table with various incredible lights (including my maligned bubbling lights from the past) and ornaments that remind us of the past and those who have shared it with us. My Dallas Cowboy ornaments would be normally right on the front of the tree, but this year I have decided to put them on the back of the tree where they can barely be seen. I will leave it to you to figure out why I'm doing that.

But the point of all this is to highlight how we try and create an attitude of Christmas good cheer and suggest that peace on earth and stillness and serenity are all around us. Bev and I surfeit on Hallmark movies which are truly artistic shields to the realities of the world around us. But even in these movies the ever encroaching 'woke' culture of post-modern America has started to become very evident with the attendant reality of the collapse of the nuclear family. So, goes our attempts to make the season something that pushes back on the encroaching darkness.

You are probably now saying "who gave this poor soul permission to write this article?" Here is why I am writing. If you read the Gospel accounts of the first 'Advent' season, it was everything but calm, bright, gentle or merry. It was a world that did not stop being dark, cruel, murderous, and threatening just because of Christmas. In fact, it

was because of that very dark, cruel, murderous and threatening world that we are reminded of why the God-man, the only adequate possible Savior of humankind lost in spiritual darkness was needed. Just think:

- Mary was pregnant with a child before she was finally married to Joseph. A stoning offense in those days.
- Shepherds were visited by the angels, but respectable people would stay clear of them because they were unclean. Social disdain for some people exists even today.
- Herod the Great fully embraced the genocide of infant boys to assuage his maniacal insecurity. This brutality would send Mary and Joseph with the infant Jesus fleeing to Egypt.
- The Roman Empire was 'taxing' or more accurately getting a tally of who could serve in their brutal and tyrannical grip on the Mediterranean world.

Now here is my point. For the Good News to be truly good news, it had to find its place in a dark and brutal world that was broken and full of broken people. It was a world then and now that does not stop being broken and fallen just because Advent rolls around culminating in Christmas. As I just read this week: "...it's precisely that harsh, evil darkness that properly reminds us why a Savior needed to 'advent' ['come'] into our time and space in the firsts place."

So, let me challenge you not to fall into some kind of Christmas denial syndrome where we try to hermetically seal ourselves off from the reality of the world. No, indeed. Instead let us as we light the Christmas tree and hang the greens and sing of angels, shepherds, and wise men, let those symbols speak to the radiance of the Gospel Message that was incarnated in a feeding trough in a Bethlehem cave. A radiance that was intentionally meant to confront the real darkness of the real world. Let us with Gospel realism say with Isaiah: And the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together. For the mouth of the Lord has spoken. Spoken indeed in the Living Word that was all God was and became all that we are in order to bring light into our darkness and salvation to our lostness. Soli Deo gloria!

THE MODERATOR'S MUSINGS

"And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over

their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." – Luke 2: 8 – 12.

Each year, we read this section of Scripture during the Christmas season as we celebrate the birth of our Savior, but do we take the time to seriously consider the ramifications? "... a Savior has been born to you!" God became man! Let me repeat that... God became man!! God, who created the entire universe, humbled himself to come to earth as a man! Let that sink in. The Creator of everything became a helpless infant, totally dependent on his mother for survival. The omnipotent, all-powerful God became a powerless, completely vulnerable human baby! Can you understand why some people think that concept is ridiculous? It seems totally illogical. The infinite becomes finite... the omnipotent becomes helpless... the omnipresent limited by a physical body! It does challenge commonsense. Yet that is exactly what happened! And is it really that unbelievable? I mean, seriously, if God is all powerful... unlimited... able to do anything he wishes, why shouldn't he be able to come to Earth as a child? If we believe he can't then are we not denying his ability to do whatever he pleases? We are putting limits on God! As many have written, we are creating God in OUR image! How incredibly arrogant!!! Natalie Grant's song "King of the World" addresses it very well:

[Verse 1]

I tried to fit you in the walls inside my mind. I try to keep you safely in between the lines. I try to put you in the box that I've designed. I try to pull you down, so we are eye to eye. [Chorus]

When did I forget that you've always been the king of the world?

I try to take life back right out of the hands of the king of the world.

How could I make you so small when you're the one who holds it all?

When did I forget that you've always been the king of the world?

I also recall a sermon I heard several years ago about a father and child who came upon an ant hill that had been severely damaged by an animal or other person. The child watched as ants scurried around trying to salvage whatever they could. It was total chaos with many dead or injured ants. The child asked his father if they could help the ants, "Is there something I can do to show them I care about them and love them?" The father replied, "The ants would not understand you or what it is that you are doing if you try to help the ants. They would see you as just another enemy and try to bite you. The only way that you could help them in a way that they would understand is to become an ant yourself. Then they would see that you can identify with their problem, and they would accept your help. You would be able to be of assistance to them because you would be like them in many ways. But since you cannot become an ant, it is probably best we let them alone." (excerpts from The Wonder of Christmas 2 – The Incarnation by Pastor Mike Partch.) While the child could not become an ant, God became a man... Jesus! And, as a man, Jesus was able to show us "the way, the truth, and the life." "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." And it is Jesus' arrival that we celebrate on Christmas! Emmanuel... God with us!!

So, as we celebrate Christmas this year, let us all take time to consider the enormity of what happened on that day in Bethlehem and to thank God for the incredible gift he gave us. Improbable, illogical, or impossible to some, but not to those of us who truly believe!

The Anti-Moderator Writes Again...

Prologue: For those confused by the title Anti Moderator, one of the Church Moderator's responsibilities is to "Foster understanding and harmony within the church, providing counsel, and promoting interchange of ideas, plans and procedures." Many believe that the Moderator should not express his or her own opinion but simply act as a mediator, arbitrator, or facilitator to achieve harmony in the church via compromise, concession, or consensus. But there are times when solving a problem requires that someone ruffle feathers, challenge the status quo, and purge some paradigms. That someone is the Anti-Moderator. The Anti-Moderator felt the need to expand on an article that appeared in the October newsletter. That article focused on criticisms aimed at the Board of Trustees. And while it's true that the Trustees are often the target of disapproval, The Anti-Moderator recognizes that ALL church leaders and many volunteers feel the burdens of leadership... including receiving comments like those directed at the Trustees. This can cause any church leader or volunteer to question why they should continue offering their time and talents. But when the critics are given the opportunity to get involved and help correct the issues they raise, they decline... citing their busy schedule, unwillingness to work with certain people, or other similar excuses. So, the burden of leadership remains with the current volunteers, who know that "you can't make everybody happy." Now many do express thanks for the efforts of leaders and volunteers, but the criticisms keep coming. This eventually takes its toll, and the leaders and other volunteers get "burned out." They no longer want to deal with the stress and negativity, and they quit... or worse, they leave the church. Now there is even more pressure on the volunteers who remain. Further, others who are not volunteering see the burden that leadership puts on people, and they become less inclined to get involved. The implications are obvious: fewer and fewer people taking on more responsibilities, spread themselves "too thin," which leads to even further stress and "burn out." Complicating the issue further, they hear complaints like, "Why are they always in charge?" -or- "Why are the same names always in the Nominating Committee report?" -or- "Larry Spivots (fictitious name) has too much power at this church." This second-guessing or "guttersniping" adds to their urge to step aside and

let somebody else do the job. But who is "somebody else?" While The Anti-Moderator awaits somebody else, let me change the tone of this article.

The Anti-Moderator and the Moderator were very impressed by Pastor Ivan's sermon in which he spoke of grit or endurance. The Anti-Moderator can see the grit or endurance in so many of our leaders and volunteers. Many felt a call to the positions where they serve. They have God-given gifts and realize that they must use these gifts, or they will disappoint God. James 4:17 says: "Remember, it is sin to know what you ought to do and then not do it." And so, they accept the challenges... and do the best they can with what they have to offer. Many take on tasks or perform activities that they never thought they would ever do. As the saying goes, "God doesn't call the qualified, He qualifies the called." We have so many examples of that in our own congregation. Some who never dreamed they would ever lead a Sunday school class, now do it on a regular basis. Others who never had any intentions of playing their guitar in public have done so often in our sanctuary. Still others who have an intense fear of speaking in public have given several children's sermons or served as a worship leader! The Anti-Moderator heard the following quote recently, "Fearlessness is a lack of fear, while bravery is the ability to confront fear and do what needs to be done even in the face of danger or difficulty. Fearlessness is a passive trait, while bravery is an active one. Fearlessness is a state of being, while bravery is an action taken in spite of fear." (Original source unknown) Suffice it to say, our congregation has many brave folks who have shown grit and overcome their fears to respond to a calling from God to contribute and to lead. While they might not receive accolades for their contributions on earth, they will in the next life! Finally, The Anti-Moderator needs to comment briefly on Pastor Ivan. He continues to set a very high bar with respect to his sermons, his dedication to visitation, and the other gifts he brings to our congregation. We are incredibly, incredibly blessed to have him serving as our interim pastor.
