I am not particularly good at writing newsletter articles. You would not think that would be the case since I have written sermon manuscripts for decades and still write them today. But,

for some reason not known to mortal man (that is me if you don't know it) I struggle with these articles. I think I waver between saying way too much and not saying enough. So, this is a plea for mercy as I offer these thoughts to you today.

I was reading our devotional guide graciously given to all of us by the Board of Christian Education called Come Alive. In the reading for Palm Sunday the author asks, 'Can you imagine what must have been going through the mind of Jesus?' Good question. From all the outward trappings of the crowd and the spreading of garments and waving palm branches coupled with the shouting messianic charged words like Hosanna, you would think things could not have been better for Jesus. I'm sure his disciples certainly thought so. Their dream, indeed, the dream of the entire nation, for a 'son of David' to be the Messianic King, seemed to be on the verge of being fulfilled. What a day!

But the author of our study guide rightly points out that Jesus knew what was coming at the end this seeming glorious week. And what was coming? Betrayal and the Cross. So, if I had been writing the devotional for Palm Sunday I might have given it the title: It's Sunday, but Friday is coming! I think I even preached a sermon years ago with that title. It is a spin off the great sermons preached by S.M. Lockridge and Tony Campollo titled It's Friday, But Sunday is Coming. You can see the incredible difference in focus. One begins with all things good but ending in horrible tragedy and death. The other begins in horrible tragedy and death and ends in all things good because of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

As we move through the week of Easter and following, we need to hold these two thoughts together: It's Sunday, but Friday is Coming and It's Friday, but Sunday is Coming. They are essential to our faith as Christians and in some ways frame our lives in this world. What do I mean? Just a few quick words. For our faith Sunday required Friday for you and I to experience salvation. The Cross will fulfill the image of the

Passover Lamb and Day of Atonement. The death of Christ will satisfy God's righteous justice and purchased mercy for us. Dying on our behalf, Jesus died the death we deserved. When we acknowledge our need for forgiveness through repentance and believe in Christ's sufficient sacrifice, we are given the gift of mercy. Yes, Friday was required! But Friday without Sunday would have been futile and accomplished nothing. Without the Resurrection we would have had sympathy without victory and justification. Satan, the great adversary, would have won. Without the Resurrection death would remain the final enemy. By our Lord's triumph in the Resurrection, Jesus has taken the fear and sting out death has become the downpayment of what we will all experience on the Great Final Day-the Eschaton. But, to tickle your mind a little, let me suggest that I have found life to follow the pattern of It's Sunday but Friday is Coming and It's Friday, but Sunday is Coming. I can remember in my life when all things were just glorious, sort a Palm Sunday kind of day—but only have that glorious day come crashing down in family illness and loss. Have you been there? I also have been standing surrounded in my life with the broken pieces of hurt, pain, and loss, only to have the

God who raised Jesus from the death bring healing and wholeness and, yes, even victory despite the losses, indeed, even through them. Have you been there? Yes it was Friday but Sunday was coming. I have in those times experienced what Paul was trying to say in Romans 8:35-39. Well, think about these words and grant mercy to your pastor—poor old thing, he can go on so!

A NEW CHURCH SAFETY POLICY

In response to a review of our church insurance

policy and a discussion with the church's legal counsel, the Board of Trustees decided to assemble a safety policy to impose some restrictions on the activities that church staff and volunteers can perform within the church and on church premises. These rules are being instituted to ensure the safety of those working around the church. All the provisions in the policy are consistent with those imposed by other organizations. The full policy is posted on the bulletin board in the church office. Copies can be made available upon request.

The Board recognizes that the policy is not perfect and further revisions and additions will likely be needed in time. However, we felt it was necessary to get an initial version released to address several unsafe practices that have been reported/observed. Regarding our motivation, first and foremost, we do not want to see anyone get hurt while offering their time and talents to the church. However, the church's annual insurance premium has "skyrocketed" over the past two years. Should a claim be filed against the church because of an injury that occurred due to unsafe practices, our premium would increase even further OR we might not be able to find an insurance provider that is willing to cover our church.

THE ASSISTANT MODERATOR'S MUSINGS

So much to write about... so little time!! As I sit down to write this

month's edition of the Musings, we are in the midst of Holy Week... or Passion Week... or Easter Week...whatever name you want to apply to the days leading up to Easter. By the time you read this, Easter 2025 will be in the past and we will be counting down the days to Pentecost...or will we? Will our thoughts be on the incredible happenings that Sunday morning near Jerusalem... that Jesus the Christ arose from the dead... defeated death... and ensured eternal life for all who believe in Him??? Or will we be thinking about what we are going to do with all the Easter candy, colored eggs, dinner leftovers? Will our focus be on what is awaiting us at work... or that upcoming doctor's appointment... or figuring out what that weird noise is coming from under the hood of our car... or who the Bills will take in the NFL draft??? Will the crush of daily life push aside any thoughts about what we were to celebrate over the prior week... Maundy Thursday... Good Friday... A seemingly endless Saturday... before morning broke on Resurrection Sunday??

An event that rocked our world should keep our attention for more than a few days, eh? But in our world today, so many are totally clueless about what Jesus did... what He said... what He taught... what His life, death, and resurrection truly means for those who believe. And that is incredibly sad! Yeah... yeah... yeah... you've heard or read it all before. If only more people were to following Jesus... live as He would have us live... what a wonderful world this would be!

But how will others ever know the Good News if no one tells them?? Each day we read more and more articles about how people are falling away from the church... not seeing the value in belonging... finding other things to do on their Sunday mornings. And yet they feel a void in their lives. They crave meaning or purpose. And many are lonely... seeking fellowship or friendships. But for some reason, they don't see church or Christianity as the answer. Why is that??? Why is it so difficult for the unchurched to try church??? What must the "churched" do to reach the "unchurched"??? How do we make them feel the need to attend?? If you were in their position, what would you want to see... want to hear... want to feel??? If you were in their shoes... if you could see church through their eyes... OK... if you are looking for answers here, you will be very disappointed, because I don't know the answers... but maybe if we put our heads together, we could come up with some. The Seekers Class has been delving into questions like these and will continue to do so for another few weeks. If you'd like to join in the conversations, stop in on Sunday morning after the worship service. We can use all the clever ideas we can get!!

Grabbing another gear, a few weeks ago a stranger wearing hospital garb entered our sanctuary with his belongings and sat down in the front row. After the worship service, several folks approached him, looking to provide support and to show Christian compassion. They discovered that the man had just gotten out of the hospital and needed a ride home. The natural Christian instinct was to do whatever we could to help. Ultimately Pastor Ivan drove him home. But here's the rest of the story. The pastor of this man's home church called the following day to warn us that the man was mentally unstable, that the Wellsville church had a restraining order against him and that he is not allowed on their church property because he becomes very violent if he does not get what he wants. In short, we were very lucky that he didn't become violent at our church or in Pastor Ivan's vehicle and hurt someone... like Pastor Ivan. The takeaway here is that we need to be careful in how we approach and deal with strangers. In our desire to help, we might trigger a response we don't want or expect if we ultimately can't deliver on our promises. Sad but true!!

On a personal note, congratulations to Deb Wuethrich for getting her latest book published. I know how long she worked on that book and how much she struggled to get it finished. And she even made the front page of the Olean Times Herald! Way to go, Deb!!
