### A PROPERTY UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

Much has happened since the last building update earlier this year. This article provides a high level overview of the progress made. One of the more significant was yet another change in the contractor doing the work on the exterior of the church. Those activities are now being handled by Blaine Reardon, owner of Reardon General Contracting. Mr. Reardon and his crew have removed much of the aggregate on the east side of Fellowship Hallway. Most of those decorative extensions or "fins" will not be replaced. Further, the "fins" on the taller portion of Fellowship Hall will be reduced in size, thereby decreasing the cost of the modifications. Reardon's company has also sealed the roof, which should significantly reduce the number of leaks we'll experience this winter.

Another major project is the installation of the new digital sign on South Street. A church member made a sizeable donation toward the purchase of the sign. However, the price of the sign ended up being \$1,300 more than what was donated. Further, the cost to build the concrete foundation, run the electrical wiring, put the sign in place, etc. will exceed \$10,000, leaving the church with an unpaid balance of over \$11,000.

If anyone feels moved to donate toward the aggregate and/or digital sign projects, please contact Matt Sage, Chair of the Board of Trustees. This might be something to consider as we kick off our 2025 Stewardship Campaign. Finally, volunteers from Intandem have been working around the church under the direction of Jim Molyneaux and their Intandem Supervisor, Alex Carpenter. These folks have helped clean up the parking lot, worked on the flower beds, and helped organize our remaining space in the carriage house. The Trustees also thank Michael Nutt for his help installing the security cameras, the new monitoring system, and his assistance with the digital sign. In Hebrews 3: 7-11 we read, Therefore, as the Holy Spirit says: Today, if you will hear His voice, Do not harden your hearts, as in the rebellion, in the day of trial in the wilderness, Where your fathers tested Me, tried Me, and saw

My works forty years. Therefore, I was angry with that generation, and said, "They always go astray in their heart, and they have not known My ways." So I swore in my wrath, "They shall note enter My Rest."

The writer is referring to the Israelites when they first approached the Promised Land in Numbers chapters 13 & 14. At that time Moses sent twelve spies to reconnoiter the land and then return with a report. When the spies returned, Ten told grim tales of giants, walled cities, and insurmountable enemies, and warned the Congregation of Israel that it was hopeless to go forward. Two spies tried to encourage the people, remembering God's presence, power, and promises, saying, "Let us go up at once and take possession, for we are well able to overcome it." (Num. 13:30).

Ultimately the people chose to harden their hearts towards God by disbelieving His promise and power. All the way back in Genesis 15:13-16, over 400 years earlier, God had promised Abraham that his descendants would one day be delivered from bondage and would return to the Promised Land that God had given to Abraham and his posterity. These Israelites had seen God's awesome power repeatedly in the 12 plagues which God sent upon the Egyptians. They had experienced God's supernatural deliverance at the coast of the Red Sea when Pharoah's army was bearing down upon them. They had witnessed the victory God gave when Aaron and Hur held up Moses arms in the battle with the Amelekites. They had been participants in God's blessings as they drank the water which flowed from a rock. They "knew" so much, but when they let fear rule, they forgot it all and ran away from all the good things God had in store for them. Unbelief closes the doors to God's blessings.

May God help us as a congregation to set aside all fear and move forward together in full confidence and faith in our Triune God, who has done and shall do the most incredible things! Together we will see God's hand at work, we will see the lost, saved. We will see the Name of Jesus exalted. We will see the people of God growing in Christ-likeness.



# THE ASS'T MODERATOR'S MUSINGS

As I write this latest issue of the Musings, I am traveling

home from a trip to Houston where Penny and I attended the 2025 Texas A&M TurboPump Symposium. I've written about this conference in the past and it continues to be one of the highlights of my year. Connecting with old friends, making new acquaintances, giving lectures, teaching classes, and walking around the exhibit hall learning about innovative technologies inspire and uplift me. I return home energized and almost immediately start making plans to attend the conference the following year. But this year's conference was a bit different because I realized that I need to start passing my numerous batons (i.e., presentations, short courses, etc.) to the younger engineers at our company. Maybe it was my recent medical issues or maybe I just came to the realization that I am not getting any younger or maybe it was that still small voice whispering in my ear. Regardless, I knew it was time for me to step aside and let others take the podium... increase their visibility. And so, I publicly announced my intention to scale back my involvement in leadership at the TurboPump Symposium. I still plan to attend the conference in the future... I'd miss it too much if I didn't... but going forward, I'll be more of an observer and/or mentor than in leadership. That will be a very strange feeling for me, but I know it's the right thing to do.

The same is true regarding my leadership roles at Olean First Baptist Church. As I confirmed in the last edition, Penny and I will be moving to our new home in Nags Head, NC sometime in the next few months. As a result, I will be resigning from the Board of Trustees and the position of Assistant Moderator. I will no longer be part of the senior choir or the 3:16 praise team and others will be leading the Seekers Class. Will my departure create some voids? Maybe... but that might be a good thing. For several years now, I have struggled with what role God wanted me to fill at our church. I am a firm believer that He nudges us... or shoves us... in certain directions so that we fulfill His objectives. But recently, it seems that no matter what I tried to do, I was met with frustration, resentment, distrust, and even anger. And so, I asked God, "Is it time to step aside?" And while I never got a direct answer, a series of events led me to ultimately

conclude that the answer is "Yes. It's time to move on." And so, I shall! However, before I do, I plan to share some observations on what I think our church needs to do to survive in the future. Now these will be my thoughts and/or opinions, which doesn't make them right, but I hope the remaining church leaders and the congregation will at least consider them as you map out the church's future direction.

At the top of my list of things to consider is the lack of communications, or maybe more to the point, a lack of the right kinds of communication. Building on a thought from the end of last month's Musings, I now understand that the topic of us leaving the church has been bandied about for several weeks. It was even the subject of much open discussion at one of the recent church gatherings. So how is it that no one felt comfortable enough to ask Penny or me if it was true? It was OK to discuss it with others but not with us? Why is that?

Now, before anyone overreacts, this is just one example of how the rumor mill or grape vine can cause misunderstandings, misinterpretations, hard feelings, or divisions within our church. So, let me ask you directly, if someone has wronged you, do you approach that person directly or do you tell anyone else who will listen about how thoughtless or mean that person is? And if you do the latter, are you expecting that those people will continue to spread your negative comments to others? Or to those who hear negative comments about someone, do you challenge the offended person to approach the accused offender, or do you pass on the negative comments to others? Or perhaps you discover that someone has made a mistake on a report or PowerPoint slide. Do you speak to the person privately and give them a chance to correct their mistake or do you point the mistake out publicly or in a "reply to all" e-mail so that everyone sees the mistake the person made?

These are just two examples of how your response to circumstances can demonstrate grace or malice. In such cases, what would Jesus do?? For an answer, you might want to check Matthew 18:15-17.

And if that doesn't do it for you, try Matthew 5:9.

## **Literacy of Love Update**

"'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future.'" Jeremiah 29:11.

Our church family has been small and mighty. Literacy of Love has been blessed by so many of our members through advocacy, prayer, sponsorship and support. Can you imagine that this past summer marked my 13th year working in Uganda?

As I reflect on my most recent journey, my heart is gripped with the overwhelming realization of the Lord's grand guidance. In both correction, redirection and blessings, it's clear to see God's fingerprint in everything. I read a quote by Frederick Buechner that says, "The place God calls you to is where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." Despite our many challenges, years of devastation, disappointments, and perpetual first-hand encounters with treachery, I feel a deep sense of gladness knowing that we are doing what is pure, right, and noble. Through all the times our journey seemed impossible, when the seeds we planted weren't growing, when the trees we had weren't producing fruit, there has been a deep and unwavering sense of drive and purpose, of passion and devotion.

Something new happened this year. On January 1, the police station called us and asked us to come. There was a young boy who had been abandoned, and they had no idea what to do with him. He appeared to be both deaf and non-verbal and deathly ill with malaria. After years of effort, we finally succeeded in working cooperatively with our district officials who connected us to child welfare where we signed documents to take full custody of this child. We named him Moses (how apropos), gave him a birthday, and brought him home where he received medical care, clothing, a bed, love, and brothers and sisters. Months later, I am pleased to share that Moses is doing well in school, has friends, smiles, laughs, and he even talks. Deaf? Nonverbal? No, just traumatized.

Since that time, the district has sought our help with their most severe cases. We now support other children, like Moses, who were discarded, tortured, abused, and abandoned. We've had an influx of both new children and new sponsors. Among the new ones we help are a few foster families whom we are giving a hand up so they can better provide for the children they kindly care for but receive very little help to manage from the government. When I witnessed our grown leader, Erick, signing documents to bring Moses into our family, when

I counseled children alongside of him, when I listen to him explain how the district wants him to join their counsel, I was struck with surreal realization of the incredible, surreal reality and power of what we are doing, all of us, together, hand-in-hand. Erick was once Moses. Imagine...Who will Moses become some day?

This summer we hired Eden to weld doors and windows for our construction projects. Jude oversaw the expansion of our medical center. Ssema gave all of our children haircuts before returning to school. Lailah tailored the children's new uniforms. Shalif made us a new shelf for home. Kudrah sewed us ambassador "dolls" and baskets to sell. Prossy shared her new skills in juice-making with our visitors. Matthius beaded rosaries with the crosses our children made with visitor and local potter, Tara. Tom, Resty, and Docus treated our sick children at the clinic. Erick managed our mission trip, and Lu was our driver.

Take a look at LiteracyOfLove.org. Aslan, a newly employed developer, remade it! It's gorgeous. Look at that!!! Our very own tree is producing so many fruits. We employed our own grownups. Our graduates are business owners and helpers who are raising the next generation. They are the ones we are calling on to help us with our needs. Our children are doing well in school. I was fortunate to be there during Visitation Day and meet with every primary child's teacher, look over their report cards, and encourage them. In the photo, you'll see me sitting with Nakato and her teacher. Not long ago, she and her brother were rescued from torture and abandonment. Now, they are in foster care and in quality boarding school. We are also giving a hand to their foster parents to improve their situation, too.

For years, we were pruned before our tree grew any fruit at all. We have been patient in affliction, steadfast in hope, and we've clung to faith in hopes that God would allow us to prosper. We continue to pray like Jabez once did – with hope to expand our territory – not for our own gain but for the glory of God, His people, and to share love in action.

Our needs will always be endless, but our faith will also be endless. Our goal is to replace the car that was stolen from us two years ago. We have lots of renovations needed at our home, too, such as a new toilet. Ours is of disrepute. But, like all other good things, they will come in the right time. These are needs, but our dreams are big! Our faith is bigger, though!

With sincere and heartfelt gratitude, thank you for putting your faith in action. Together we can. Together we are! Praise God for the good work He began through all of us. We will remain "confident that He how began a good work, will carry it to completion."

HE 'NEVER MET A STRANGER' By Deb Wuethrich

For years, I've heard the statement that certain people "never met a stranger." I never

quite understood what it meant. Like, to me, we encounter people all the time. Some we know. Some we don't. They're strangers when you first meet them. Right?

Now, I think I understand.

We at Olean First Baptist Church have just said farewell to the man who served us as an Interim Pastor for 18 months. It was by his example of interacting with and paying value to everyone he meets that the core of the old saying finally took root. Pastor Ivan Crossno pastored a Baptist church in Cheektowaga for several decades before deciding to retire, stating that he believed his congregation was ready for a younger person to shepherd them. When he learned Olean First Baptist was in need of temporary leadership while the church continued a search for a new senior pastor, Pastor Ivan felt a call, stepped up and said, "I could do that." I don't think he expected it would be for 18 months, but thankfully, we will be welcoming a new senior pastor, Rev. Jim Balson, with an Installation Ceremony on Sept. 28 at 3 p.m. Still, Pastor Ivan took things in stride right from the beginning. He didn't just drive down to Olean on Sundays—he chose to

Even though he has resided in the Buffalo area for many years, those who encounter Pastor Ivan see a personable, authentic and caring personality. He's funny, too, often poking fun at himself.

stay several days each week. He wanted to get to know the community. To explore good relationships

within First Baptist. His wife, Bev, who was still

working at the start of his tenure, frequently spent

time here, too.

An early indication of his "never met a stranger" personality came to the forefront as he hit the ground running at our church. He would often ask others, "Who can I call or visit?" right from the get-go, then followed through. It didn't matter that these were folks he'd never met before. Pastor Ivan could enter a conversation and before it was over, people felt like they'd been chatting for years.

One time, I was on a team to deliver Home Communion to shut-ins. Pastor Ivan was part of our three-person team. Before we got down to the ritual of our purpose, Pastor Ivan was telling stories about his younger days in Arkansas, how he once was bit by a spider and almost died. How he'd encountered big snakes. How he disliked crawling under his mother's house to fix something, but did it anyway. Something in the telling was always an adventure! His outgoing personality and deep respect and caring for people taught us early on that Pastor Ivan wasn't going to just show up on Sundays, preach a sermon and go home. He immersed himself in the Olean community and linked with the GOAC (Greater Olean Association of Churches), getting to know other pastors and the community they serve.

He sat in on board meetings. Knowing he wouldn't be in the position for the long-haul didn't prevent him from having ideas, or making suggestions on practices he'd seen at his own and other churches. Pastor Ivan enjoyed our church's and community's history and traditions, and various ministry outreaches.

He didn't hesitate to go have breakfast or lunch with the members of his church. In fact, Green Acres became a favorite haunt. Once, I was present when he said, "Now don't tell Bev!" when he ordered something he thought she might not wholly approve in her quest to keep him healthy.

Through stories of his country boy roots, we learned of his love for biscuits. Good biscuits. He admitted that in fact, he was on a quest for the best biscuits out there, but deemed most any biscuit pretty good. That's why his farewell fellowship time at First Baptist included biscuits, with strawberries and whip cream. We, who were never strangers to him, now know the way to his heart. In the pulpit, he shared folksy stories while never shying away from truth that people needed to hear. In his final sermon, Pastor Ivan mentioned that he'd gained eight pounds since coming to Olean. It was probably the biscuits, church meals and eating out with friends. In his "real" retirement, he might have to re-engage in hobbies such as a repeat climb of Kilimanjaro or hiking in the Adirondacks to compensate.

Seriously, our church could not have asked for a more caring pastor to fill the gap in Olean until a new senior pastor could be hired. The folks who were never strangers to him sang along with the choir on Sunday, an "until we meet again" farewell song. The word "biscuit" was inserted for manna. Some of us couldn't say goodbye. We just said, "So long for now. Don't be a stranger."
